AT THE POLICE COURT

ALD. GRAHAM'S CASE TAKEN UP BY MAGISTRATE

And Enlarged For a Day After the Evidence For the Prosecution Had Been Taken—Accused of Obstructing One of the Streets.

The case against Ald. Christopher Graham, charged with a violation of one of the city by-laws, was proceeded with, at the police court this morning, but after the evidence for the prosecution was put in, A. B. Cunningham asked for an enlargement for a day, and the magistrate consented. City Engineer Craig, and Thomas W. Nash, provincial land surveyor, gave evidence. City Solicitor McIntyre conducted the prosecution.

The charge against Ald. Graham was that he did "unlawfully encumber and obstruct a public street in the city, to wit: Brock street, near Barrie street, by erecting steps and platform thereon." He pleaded "not guilty" to the charge.

City Engineer Craig was first called by Mr. McIntyre, and he told about the concrete steps having been constructed in front of the houses facing Brock street. The steps were an obstruction, and the permit, which had been issued at his office, did not allow for such obstruction. The front line of the house was exactly on the street.

"Was a plan of this work submitted and approved of by you?" asked Mr. McIntyre.

"No," replied the engineer.

Mr. Cunningham asked Mr. Craig if it was customary for people to have him approve of all walks made into the houses. In reply to this, the engineer said "No."

"What effect has the walk had. Did anyone complain?"

"Yes, there were complaints?"

"By whom were they made?"

"I could not give the names. Several people spoke to me about it."

THE OPEN RIFLE MATCH

WAS WON BY W. A. NEWMAN, OF KINGSTON.

The Weather Conditions Were Bad—There Were 92 Shooters—The Scores Made and the Money Prizes Won.

The open rifle match, conducted by the rifle committee of the 14th regiment, with Capt. H. J. Dawson as chairman, took place on Wednesday afternoon at the Barrickfield ranges. The weather was anything but favorable, being rainy and windy, but notwithstanding these conditions, the firing proceeded, and very good scores were made. There were 101 entries, and of these ninety-two men fired, a remarkably large percentage for such a bad day.

The highest score was made by W. A. Newman, of Alfred street, Kingston, a science student of Queen's, who is practically a green hand with the rifle. He made a score of 57 out of a possible 75, defeating even the leading marksmen of the Royal Military College and 14th Regiment.
