There will likely be three or four changes on the team this week, but they have not been given out yet. The team will be picked to-night, after practice.

In a pinch, however, Elliott can be used on the back division, as he can play any position on the team, and Connolly would be used as an outside wing. The probability, however, is that the halves will be Moran, Dixon and Leekie. Moxley will again be at quarter, and Kinella, Overaid and Clarke in the scrimmage. The likely wing line is: Gallagher, and McLeish, inside; McKay, Lloyd, middle; Smith, Elliott, outside.

The Hamilton rugby players are promising a warm time for Kilt, the Ottawa wing man, the next time the two teams meet. He is accused of having done a great deal of unnecessary rough work in last Saturday's game.

Turner, of the Hamilton rugby team is diving over a bench set several feet back from the tackling dummy and getting the latter below the knees. Turner's tackling has not been good, but he seems determined to improve it.

The Ottawa Football Club will take its strongest team to Montreal for Saturday's match against the M.A.A.A. team. Coach Clancy expects a very hard game. Stronach has recovered and was out at practice again today. There will be one change on the line, Christie replacing Convey at outside wing.

There were a lot of Detroit fans looking for Wagner, Wednesday night, at Pittsburg, claiming the mighty German had deceived their players. Wagner was hit in the ribs by Summers once and fell to the ground screaming, in what afterward proved to be mock agony.
