A TIMELY ENQUIRY.

Is Canada Losing Her Grip in Cheese Trade?

As country points dropped below 11c, yesterday, for the first time this season, striking 10 1/2c. But at that the prices all along have been below those obtained last year.

According to a competent authority, there has been an average difference of one cent per pound, and this in face of the fact that the quantity of cheese produced this year is only slightly less than last year, and that the quality, while showing no marked improvement, has indicated no marked depreciation.

In explanation of this apparent anomaly it is pointed out by a local dairy expert:

"Pasture in Canada has been better this year and an account of the improved pasturage large quantities of cheese were expected, and have actually been made.

"The lower prices are due to a considerable extent also, to the increase in New Zealand's cheese make. Last year 50,000 boxes were made in New Zealand, five years ago only 60,000 boxes were produced.

"This increase in production has been tremendous throughout the past five or six years, and the latest reports state that this year's production will exceed that of last year by 100,000 boxes.

"New Zealand's cheese has now displaced Canadian makes on the English market, in the winter season. Especially is this true of the London district as the New Zealand boats land their cargoes there.

"The present prices for Canadian cheese do not encourage our farmers to increase the number of cows. There is, they claim, too much work connected with dairying and too little pay. He will not continue in the dairying business when he can make more money out of his grain and hogs.

The only hope for Canadian cheese in the British market lies in the possibility of New Zealand turning to the manufacture of butter, in which science they excel Canadianly. They can make better butter than Canadians, and they would rather make butter than cheese. If butter prices in Great Britain advance, New Zealanders will be anxious to return to the manufacture of it, and then Canada may get another show in the British cheese market.
