The Man On Watch.

The town's activity in rifle shooting is noticed by the Lampanan. On Monday, Oct. 18th, he says, will be followed with the explosion of firearms, for the marksmen of two organizations, one military, the other civilian, will be out in force to try their skill like these archers did of old.

What does all this signify? he asks. Is it not the result of the war spirit? True, Kingston has at last got modern shooting ranges, but the civilian interest in rifle competition is unusually marked.

A man who can shoot straight is worth more than a dozen soldiers, who can march with precision and perform formation maneuvers. It is the marksmen who is to be the future soldier. "Give me a man who can hit an object at several hundred yards distance rather than a whole company of men who can't shoot," said an old-timer to the Lampanan, the other day. And so on Monday, probably 300 men, young and middle-aged, and some even past the three-score mark, will blaze away at the target.

The Lampanan learns that his remarks a week ago about the defeat of Dr. Anghin for councillor in Sydenham ward, last January, were supposed to mean that Councillor Toye was brought out as the liquor party's candidate.
