THANKSGIVING DAY SERVICES.

The people who went to church on Monday desired to express their thanks for the bounties of the year, and to hear thoughts that were pertinent to the occasion. This Canada of ours, with its splendid record of a year, with its promise of peace and prosperity, was a theme on which any preacher could have spoken unreservedly. One hardly looked for a talk on the political corruptions of the day and the part the press played, or failed to play, in the purification of our public life. The newspapers of our party were just as bad as the newspapers of the others. So it was discussed. The little editorial paragraphs, for which the people have an especial liking, offered no solace or satisfaction to this imperious critic. For the press he was not thankful. Some persons wonder why thanksgiving services are not better attended. The answer is at hand. They should be more attractive. The sermons should be appropriate. One disappointment may not seriously affect the audience, but when the disappointments are continued the average man will be excused when he offers up thanksgiving at his own fireside.

THE JUDGMENT OF WOMEN.

Attention has been called to a matter which bespeaks the sanity of the women in the matter of signing petitions. All over Ontario the sex has been appealed to on behalf of Mrs. Robinson, the unhappy and unfortunate mother of her daughters' illegitimate children. There is no case which has excited so much public sympathy. There is no one who has been so much discussed in the papers, but with a delicacy which the circumstances suggested. It seemed to be only necessary to mention the petitions to the governor-general, in the woman's behalf, in order to elicit the co-operation of all women and especially of all mothers. Yet some of them hesitated. They were not satisfied with a brief explanation. Occasionally one declined to sign the paper, and by her act appeared to condone the offence. How different the attitude of the men. Said one to the Whig, "Oh, we sign anything in the way of a petition, and are glad to find that it is not a subscription list." It would be well if every one read every thing he is asked to sign. Then a petition would mean something. If the great polyglot petition which was exhibited by the W.C.T.U. in the days of Miss Frances Willard, represented the same thoughtful, reserved common sense and judgment of the women which is associated with the Robinson case, what a power it must have represented!

HOME RULE FOR IRELAND.

T. P. O'Connor, M.P., is the representative of the national party in America, at present and for a tour of three weeks only. Mr. O'Connor is the most popular man in the party. He is one of its best speakers, and he is a man of clearness and moderation. When he makes an address it is to illuminate the people on the issues of the day, and he is above saying sharp, incisive, or sensational things for the sake of a little applause.

Mr. O'Connor has it that home rule is nearer realization than at any time in the history of Ireland. And why? As a result of the collision of the commons with the lords there is certain to be an election and in an appeal to the people the liberals will win. Thus, having attended to the financial affairs of the country, which may be meanwhile disturbed, the commons will pass a bill "abolishing the absolute veto of power of the lords, and substituting merely the authority of suspensory veto." Later a home rule bill will be enacted, and it should pass at the second session, and the lords will be made to accept the decision of the commons by the addition of liberal peers.

The verdict in the Mrs. Turner case of manslaughter when murder was expected—has surprised every one, and started the demand that the jury system should be abolished. There is not much likelihood of it. Judge Magee pronounced trial by jury the "bulwark of our safety."

A liberal council in Toronto offered the city solicitorship to Mr. Drayton, a conservative, and he declined it. Then the position was offered to Mr. Dewart, a liberal, and the World charges political influence. Which is not at all Pecksniffian, in the World's opinion.

Archibald Hurd, in the Fortnightly, argues that warships cannot be built and manned as cheaply anywhere as in England, and Canada is making a mistake, therefore, in not contributing to an imperial navy. Opinions vary so much that the people may well be confused as to what is the best policy on this subject.

So the Grand Trunk directors, with hands-filled with proxy notes, decided that the retiring president should have a pension of \$7,500 a year. Happy man, and happiest when no found C. M. Hays, who has been and is the moving spirit in the Grand Trunk system, and the inspiration that has brought it success.

The conservatives of Ontario will celebrate the 94th anniversary of Sir John Macdonald's birth on January 11th. Has the party just recalled the words of the deceased statesman, who said not long before he departed this life, that he would look down upon it and be a witness of its proceedings?
