## UNDER THE CITY DOME

### CONCERNING THE SALE OF DEBENTURES.

Others This Year Likely to Be at 4 1/2 Per Cent—More Lights For Dark Corners—Waterworks Main Extension.

It is not likely that the civic finance committee will issue any more four per cent debentures, in view of the unsatisfactory results which attended the sale of the recent ones, although the sale was better by 1-16 per cent than sales of past years. However, some of the city's four per cent debentures recently sold at par and were purchased by local parties. When there are only small amounts of debentures, the sale has generally been effected privately at par. It is thought that had the recent \$33,400 worth of debentures been sold privately, instead of by tender, a better price would have been secured.

### Small Lights For Streets.

Some years ago, a few incandescent lights were placed at the corner of Wellington and Union. No doubt there are several dark corners that would welcome an incandescent light and people in the immediate vicinity would be glad to attend to the turning of them on and off. It is quite probable that some arrangement will be made to provide a few more lights for locations that are dark and dangerous. Until there are 200 or more lamps on the streets, instead of 155 as there now will be, the city will be inadequately lighted.

### Beginning Of Expansion.

Ald. Toye says that the extension of the West street main up Barrie street to Princess is the corner of Wellington and Union. No doubt there are several dark corners that would welcome an incandescent light and people in the immediate vicinity would be glad to attend to the turning of them on and off. It is quite probable that some arrangement will be made to provide a few more lights for locations that are dark and dangerous. Until there are 200 or more lamps on the streets, instead of 155 as there now will be, the city will be inadequately lighted.

City Engineer's Report.  
The report of the city engineer on the water works mains has not yet been considered by the committee, but it is understood that it refers to the West street main extension as a necessity, as this main is one of the water feeders. The main has to be extended. There's no hurry just now as the work cannot be commenced until next spring. The main is not merely for the purpose of giving a greater water supply. The high pressure fire system is considered too expensive for Kingston, and also unnecessary.
