OLD MAN CRIED, OUT

'I AM GOING TO DROWN MYSELF.'

Albert Pennell Was Eighty Years of Age—George Lloyd, of Gananoque Had His Hand Crushed.

Gananoque, Oct. 28.—Further details in the sad drowning affair of yesterday, whereby Albert Pennell, an old and respected resident of the town, eighty years of age, lost his life, show that he had been in a despondent condition, with frequent periods of mental aberration, during the past two or three years. Yesterday morning, at breakfast time, said he was not well enough to get up. His son, W. D. Pennell, went to work as usual. Mrs. W. D. Pennell being ill with heart trouble, Mrs. Greenough, a neighbor, was in giving a hand with the work when the old man rushed downstairs, seized his hat and said, "I am going to drown myself." Mrs. Pennell was not in hearing of the words, but Mrs. Greenough seized him by the arm, but he shook her off and rushed out, followed by the woman, but when she got to the high bank in the rear of the property, his hat was flying on the bank and he was struggling in the water. Mrs. Greenough gave the alarm and help at once came. Boats were launched and drags let out, but last night unsuccessfully. At this point of Gananoque there is a strong under-current in and around what is known as the Punch Bowl, and the bottom of the river is quite rough.

ACTION FOR DIVORCE.

The Couple Married at Portmouth, Ont.

Watertown, N.Y., Standard. Mary J. Lackey, through Delaney & Fishaw, Alexandria Bay, N.Y., has commenced an action for divorce against Elwin S. Lackey, of the same place. The parties were married at Kingston, Ont., September 11th, 1905, by Rev. J. O. Crisp. Mattie Benjamin is named as co-respondent and it is claimed that the defendant is living with her.

The answer sets up that at the time the plaintiff married the defendant she had no right to remarry, because of a decree of divorce ordered by Justice M. I. Wright against her and in favor of her then husband, Henry Arnold, which decree provided that the defendant, the plaintiff in this action, should not remarry during the life of Arnold. The defendant, Lackey, also sets up in his answer that he was irresponsible when the wedding occurred, having been then intoxicated.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 25.—James McMahon has confessed that he murdered his sisters, Miss Rose McMahon and Mrs. Alonzo Van Royen, and the latter's husband, Alonzo Van Royen, on a farm near Kansas City, Kas., last Tuesday.
