THE ORPHANS' HOME

HELD ITS ANNUAL MEETING ON FRIDAY.

The Good Work Done During the Year—Superintendent Smeaton and His Wife Were Highly Complimented.

The annual meeting of the Orphans' Home was held at the home, Friday afternoon. Mayor Couper occupied the chair. Short addresses were given by Rev. T. W. Savary, Rev. C. A. Sykes and Rev. Dr. MacTavish. The children rendered several choruses and Johnny Geake favored with a solo. Mayor Couper congratulated the superintendent, Mr. Smeaton; Mrs. Smeaton and the teacher, Miss Wilder, on the success of the work.

Rev. Mr. Savary gave an interesting talk to the children and paid a warm tribute to those in charge of the home.

Mr. Sykes pointed out that the institution was not only a school, but a home for the children. Kingston had great reason to be proud of the institution.

Dr. MacTavish addressed his remarks to the friends of the institution. He said that in addition to our money we should put our prayers in the work. It was far easier to save the children when they were young, than to wait until they were old and then try to reform them.

Reports were submitted by the secretary, Mrs. A. P. Chown, and the treasurer, Mrs. Garrett, and both were of an encouraging nature.

In the report of the secretary, it was pointed out that during the past year there had been at times over 100 in the home. Many applications for admission had to be refused. The demand for children of working age had been large. Superintendent Smeaton continued to do good work by visiting the children in their homes. Great satisfaction was felt in the work of the superintendent and his wife. The health of the children was good. Several had been in the hospital, and the committee felt deeply grateful for kindness shown them while there.

Dr. Anglin and Dr. Sparks had been most attentive in their services. The children were making good progress in the schoolroom, under Miss Wilder. The death of the directress, Miss Giddens, during the year, was a heavy loss, as she had been so long identified with the home, visiting and entering into every detail. Miss Muckleston, the energetic secretary for so many years, was elected to take her place.

It was the desire of the committee to remind their friends that the cost of food, servants, wages, etc., was continually increasing. It was quite evident that larger quarters would be necessary, and it was hoped that next spring they would be able to build a new wing. They would earnestly solicit hearty co-operation and financial aid of everyone.

The following had given outings for the children: Lady Cartwright, W. F. Nickle, M.P.P., John Nichol, Thousand Island Steamboat company, and Bay Quinte railway. The committee wished to extend thanks to all its friends who had assisted in the work.

The proceedings closed with the singing of "God Save the King," after which tea was served, and the visitors shown through the home.

BLOOD OF ONE SISTER
Transfused Into Another to Save Her Life.

It is not generally known that Mrs. T. R. Carnovsky, Princess street, performed a heroic deed in the Royal Victoria hospital, in Montreal, about twelve days ago, when she allowed an artery in her left arm to be opened and about a quart of blood transfused into her sister's veins, in an attempt to save her life. Her sister, the late Mrs. E. H. Williamson, of Lindsay, was taken to Montreal for an operation, and after it was performed she began to sink rapidly. Transfusion of blood alone would save her, and Mrs. Carnovsky offered her blood. The radial artery of her left arm was opened, an incision of about two inches being made, and it was attached to a vein in her sister's wrist, by a tube. About a quart of blood passed. Mrs. Carnovsky lay on a table and would not take any anaesthetic. She was weak afterwards, but soon recovered. Her sacrifice prolonged the life of her sister four days, but the latter was too far gone to recover from her illness, and died.
