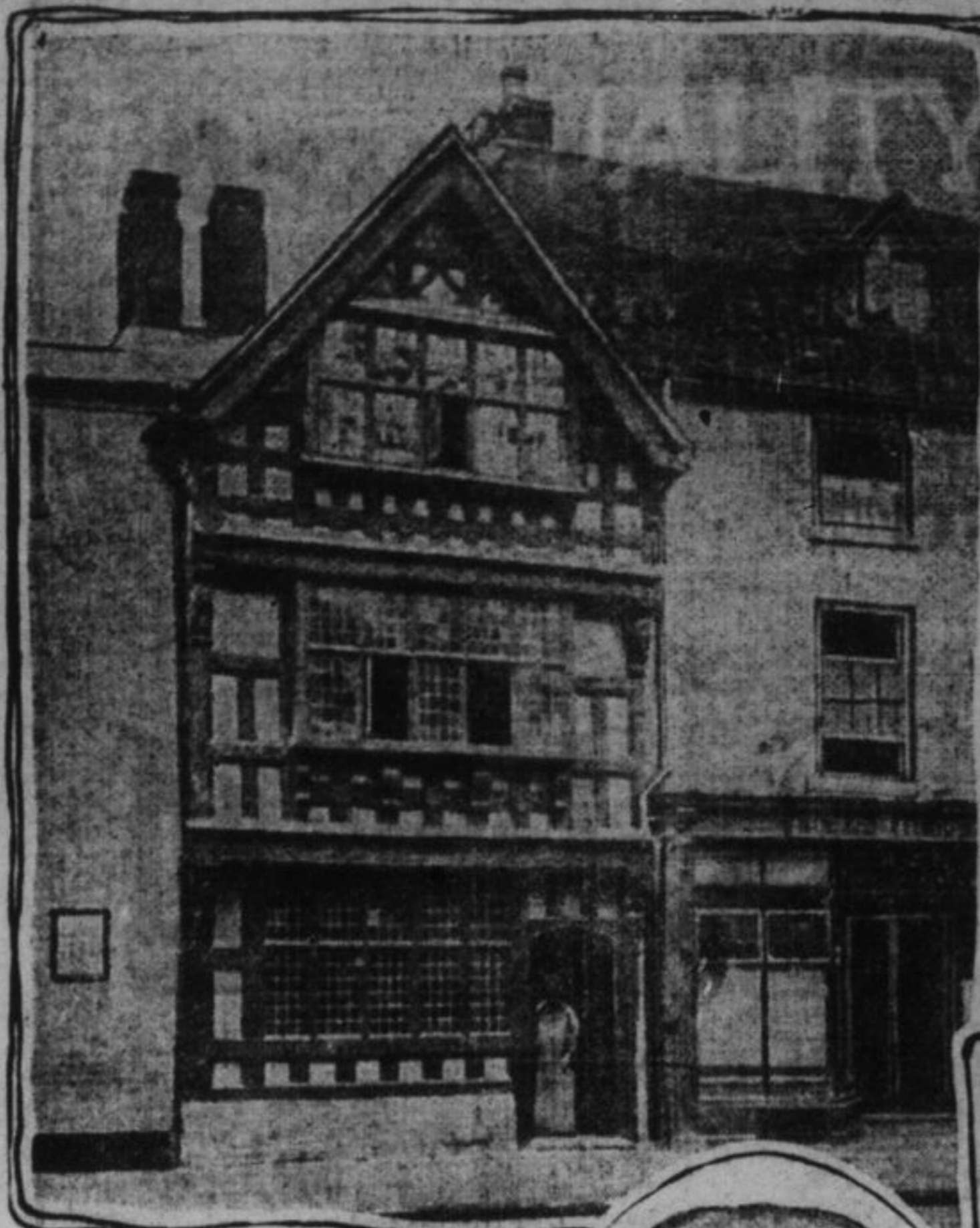


# AMERICANS HAVE HOME IN SHAKESPEARE'S TOWN.

The Sitting Room - Upstairs

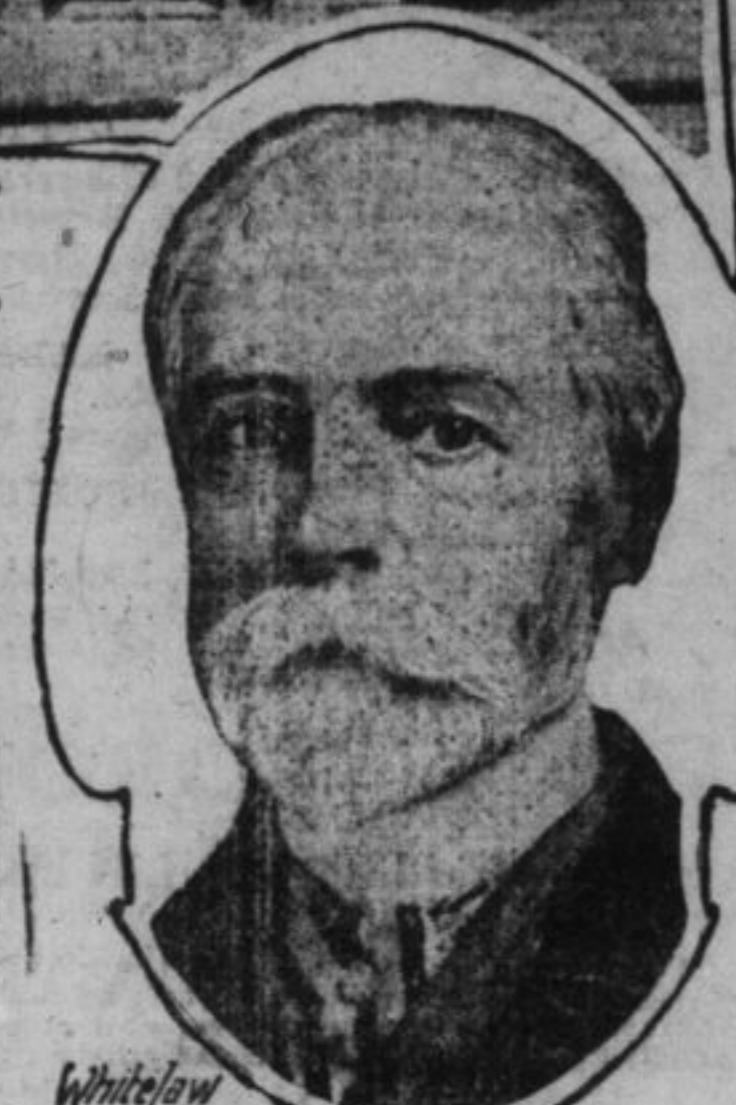
London, Oct. 26.—Miss Marie Corelli was the presiding genius of a remarkable Anglo-American festival at Stratford-on-Avon. "Harvard House," in which Katherine Rogers, friend of Shakespeare and mother of John Harvard, the founder of the oldest and perhaps the greatest American university, was opened in Shakespeare's town as a resort for visiting Americans.

Three hundred and four years ago Thomas Rogers, a worthy alderman of Stratford-on-Avon, gave away his daughter Katherine in marriage to Robert Harvard, a prosperous tradesman of Southwark. Of this marriage was born John Harvard. Thomas Rogers' house was recently for sale. Miss Corelli suggested to Edward Morris, of Chicago, the idea of establishing Harvard House as a Mecca within a Mecca for American visitors. Mr. Morris agreed, and commissioned Miss Corelli to purchase the house and restore it to its condition in Harvard's lifetime.

The opening ceremony was performed by the American ambassador, Whitelaw Reid, in the presence of a distinguished gathering, which included the bishop of Bristol, Lord Fairfax, Sir Thomas Dewar, Sir Thomas Lipton, Sir Joseph Lawrence and R. C. Lehman, M.P. Apologies for absence were received from Lord mayor of London and John Burns.

In a speech at the opening ceremony, Miss Corelli, one of the trustees, mentioned that the deed of trust required that Harvard House should never be removed from its present site. She said:

"We can perhaps picture the wedding festival that was held on April 16th, in this very dwelling—laughter and song to which these old timbers, re-echoed—the good wishes and congratulations that followed the newly-married pair as they passed out under the little quaintly carved portal to start on their life journey together. There must have been many friends and guests to bid them 'good-speed'—and among those friends and guests it

is not only possible, but probable, that there might have been a "Humanity's divinest son, That sprightliest, gravest, wisest, kindest one, Will Shakespeare."

"For Shakespeare was not only the neighbor and townsman of Katherine Rogers, but he was also a neighbor of Robert Harvard, in Southwark, where his Globe Theatre was situated. Every point of evidence tends to show that they knew each other, even if they were not on terms of positive intimacy."

"Stratford-on-Avon has long been the literary Mecca of the American people, but they have not been able to call any portion of it their very own until this moment. This quaint little house, rendered so historic by its association with John Harvard, has seemed to me the very place for them to inhabit."

The ambassador said: "On the same day on which Harvard is gaining a new president it has gained not merely one new tie with England, but two. The one, of course, is this fine old Elizabethan survival. The second tie is also notable and most recent. Harvard gained today a president. Dr. Lowell, who has done some such vice to England as the accomplished

## REMARKABLE BIRD

Picks Out Cards With Ease, Proper Words at Will and Does Other Stunts.

London, Oct. 29.—The old landmarks, the old catchwords, and the old truths are passing away. For instance, it is no longer uncomplimentary to call a person "a silly goose."



"Jimmy" has altered all that. He is a five-year-old goose, and it is said that he has a human brain. Human beings cannot but feel flattered, after they have seen what he can do, and as for the goose world—surely all good geese will subscribe to a statue to "Jimmy" and bring offerings of maize to lay at his webbed feet.

Yesterday he intimated that, having learned to spell, and to play solo whist, he had but one ambition left in life. He would like to be interviewed by a reporter like any other celebrity, and so, of course, it was arranged.

And "Jimmy" is really a very wonderful fellow—a little solemn, of course, with something of the erudite air of an Oxford tutor, and something of the dignity proper in a bird whose forefathers saved Rome. Having made his bow he got to business. A pack of playing cards was spread before him. "Ten of diamonds," demanded his master, and after examining a number of cards, "Jimmy" picked out the right one in his bill. 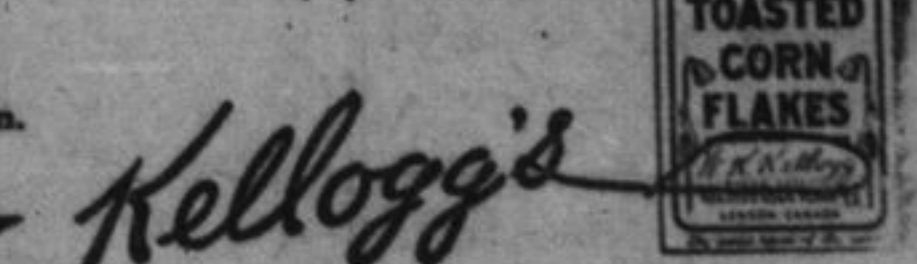

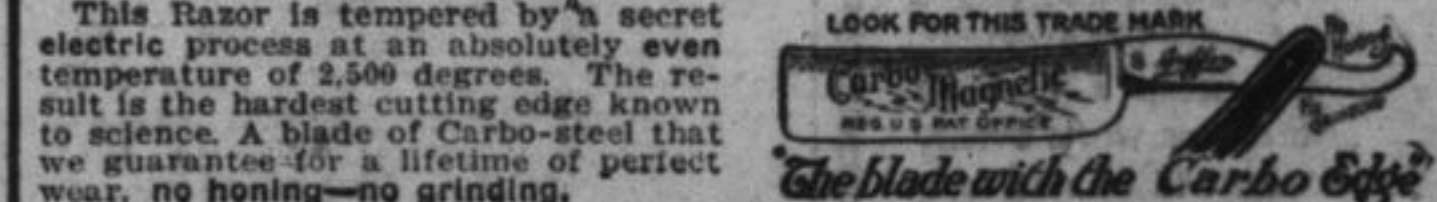
