Hon. H. R. Empson announced himself, in an interview at Toronto, as opposed to the government's naval policy.

Frank J. Hayes, secretary-treasurer of the Illinois miners, may oppose Sam Gompers for the A. F. of L. presidency.

Stanley McFarvey, a seven-year-old Strathroy boy, became entangled in a rope and fell into a barrel. He was strangled.

QUARTER MILLION BUSHELS

Of Grain Come to Kingston in October.

The amount of coal received here from across the border during October was 11,021 tons.

At a banquet he gave to Roman Catholic bishops and archbishops, he said in his address that he was proud to be elected Mayor of London, and that he would do his best to serve the city.

TRAVELLER LET OUT

RELEASED FROM COBOURG JAIL ON SATURDAY.

He Was Sent Up For Having Lifted His Hat and Sought the Company of a Lady Who Did Not Desire It.

Cobourg, Nov. 1.—Through the intervention of the Commercial Travellers' Association, and the clemency of the minister of justice, J. S. Walker, a traveller for a tea house, was liberated from the county jail, here, Saturday, after serving three weeks of a three-months' sentence, imposed by Magistrate Holland, of Port Hope, for raising his hat to a woman whom he didn't know on the streets of Port Hope, and seeking to have her company. Mr. Walker left at once for his home in Ottawa. According to his story, Mr. Walker, who is a middle-aged man with a wife and family, has been very harshly treated and the Commercial Travellers' Association has taken up the matter to see if some redress cannot be secured.
