Washington, Nov. 2,-Government officials in the internal revenue de partment are puzzled to know what is being done with all the whiskey that is being taken from bond. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of nomestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00 W. W. COHY.
