## WHERE DOES IT GO?

### DRINKING LOT MORE WHISKEY THAN EVER.

Prohibition Wave Has Had No Apparent Effect on Consumption—The Trust's Profits.

Washington, Nov. 2.—Government officials in the internal revenue department are puzzled to know what is being done with all the whiskey that is being taken from bond. Although it is the common opinion of those who have observed life in the large cities that public drunkenness is not near as prevalent as it used to be, the strange fact remains that the consumption of whiskey is steadily on the increase, and that, too, at a rate out of proportion to the growth of population.

Inasmuch as the farmers are not using whiskey as a liquid fertilizer for their crops, and inasmuch, also, as there is no record of the substitution of whiskey for gasoline as a motive power for automobiles, the suspicion is strong in the minds of government experts that the American people are not paying any too much attention, privately, to the prohibition wave that was supposed to be sweeping over the country. Whether the actual per capita consumption is much larger than usual cannot yet be accurately determined, but certain it is that distillers and other commercial agencies report a substantial increase in the revenue of sales made by whiskey dealers.

Curiously enough the annual report of the Distillers Securities Corporation for the year ended June, 30th last, shows that despite the activity of the prohibition propagandists, the withdrawals of whiskey for the period covered by the report largely increased. Other statistical facts are adduced to prove this. Returns made to the commissioner of internal revenue show that the average annual withdrawals of whiskey from bond for the last eleven years were 112,332,110 gallons, whereas the withdrawals in the fiscal year just passed were 124,501,408 gallons—the largest ever recorded. The question is, What was it withdrawn for? To drink, say the experts.

Most of the whiskey now being drunk is of the stomach-biting, high-wine sort. It is "green," lacks age and, under the Pure Food Law, taxes the ingenuity of the cleverest fakery in the business to give it the necessary color, taste and smoothness without disclosing to the gullible drinkers the nature and extent of the adulterations.

### DEFENDS THE RAID.

Jameson Exploit Did Not Cause War.



DR. JAMESON. Montreal, Nov. 2.—Sir Percy Fitzpatrick had a large audience at the luncheon of the Canadian Club, of Montreal, when he gave an address on South Africa. The fundamental reason for the South African war, he said, was that the Dutch deliberately set out to dominate the whole of South Africa, recognizing no other race and no other language but their own. For instance, the French Huguenots, who emigrated there were forbidden to use their language, or to attend any other than the Dutch churches, while the French Roman Catholics were treated very much as the Indians were treated in this country. As the leader in this growing intolerance, there arose Kruger. Cecil Rhodes found when he worked for security of rights and for justice between man and man, that he was butting against a stone wall.

"Therefore," said Sir Percy, "he was a party to the raid. I am not going to discuss that, because I was one of those who got in for it. But I ask you to believe that this raid did not cause the war any more than half a dozen other raids from the other side. For that was not the only raid. There were lots of others by the Boers. With the object of 'collaring' native territory and gaining access to the sea—all for the purpose of setting up this foreign government."

Died in West Africa. Richmond, Va., Nov. 2.—Richmond was shocked, yesterday, when a cable was received from London, England, announcing the death of Dr. Frederick Garatty at West Africa. He was a nephew of Mrs. Hart, and whom he lived with from his childhood, until a few years ago, when he went abroad as a surgeon for a steamboat company.

### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Entries—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Dated—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to clear homesteaded pasture) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Dated—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
