

## ROBINSON ENTERED FOR TWENTY-EIGHT YEARS.

Does Not Appear to Feel His Position, But Thankful He Escaped the Gallows—Signed Petition For Clemency in His Wife's Case.

"I do not care if I go to the pen for fifty years, as long as they do not send me to the gallows."

This is the bold statement credited to James Robinson, who was sentenced to twenty-eight years in the penitentiary, at the Sudbury assizes, for a terrible crime, and who entered the big prison, on Tuesday afternoon.

Provincial Detective J. A. Thomson and J. Hicks, of Sudbury, had charge of the prisoner. They left Sudbury at ten o'clock on Monday night, and arrived in Kingston at two o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

According to the statement of the two men who brought him down, the prisoner does not care one iota about the sentence he received; he appears altogether indifferent to it. However, he is very thankful that he escaped the gallows, and it is stated that he fully expected that would be his fate.

Robinson is now fifty-three years old, and should he live to serve out his long term, will be eighty-one years of age. He is very cheerful, and his behavior could not be accounted for by the consolers who have had him in the charge. He does not appear to realize the seriousness of his awful crime, or at least if he does, his endeavors to push it aside, as if it is nothing.

It is always the privilege of prisoners while being taken to Kingston, to smoke good cigars on the way down, and Robinson was very吸烟. He was very talkative and engaged in conversation with the two officers a good deal of the way.
