Father Says It Has Cost Him \$1,000 to Bring Him Back When He Runs Away So Often.

New York, Nov. 3.—Alfred Bryan, of 122 West Thirty-sixth street, who composed "Are You Sincere?" and "Sympathy," arrived in town from London, Ont., and straightway huffed his son, Leo, to the West side police court.

"This boy is incorrigible," said the father to Magistrate Krotel. "I should like you to send him away for three months, or until I can arrange to send him to a military school in Stanton, Va. He's not a bad boy, but he is continually running away. It has cost me fully \$1,000 in the past six months to bring him back from London, Ont. He is in love with his cousin, a school teacher, who lives in London, but he is only a kid and she is twenty-one. The girl is a daughter of John McGregor, 652 York street, London. Every chance he gets he goes up there, and he gets romantic ideas."

Leo, who is tall for his age, stood much embarrassed during his father's recital. His face brightened when Magistrate Krotel told the father that the boy could not be sent away simply for being in love.

"If he is absolutely incorrigible," said the magistrate, "I can send him to the reformatory. But he will have to stay there at least two years."

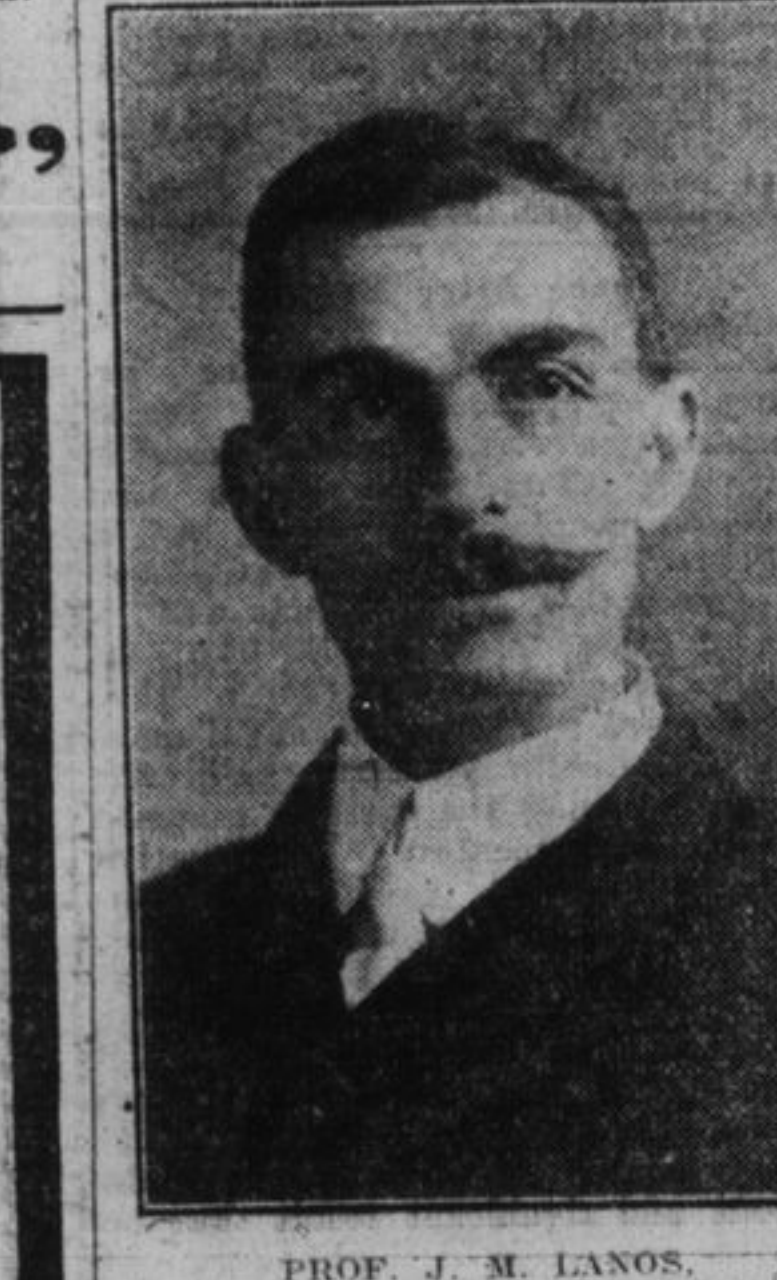

KINGSTON BRANCH FORMED

Of L'Alliance Francaise—Prof. Macgillivray President.

On Tuesday evening, a meeting was held in the Frontenac Business College building of those interested in the formation of a branch of L'Alliance Francaise, and thirty prominent ladies and gentlemen were present. Prof. J. M. Lanos, of the Royal Military



College, delegate of the Alliance, was present, and explained the workings of the body in France, and also in foreign countries, and outlined also the constitution of committees and the bureau.

It was decided to form a Kingston branch and the following were elected: President, Prof. John Macgillivray; vice-president, Mrs. W. R. Givens; secretary, Capt. J. A. G. Roy; committee, G. A. Balo, J. B. Walker, K. C. Taylor, Miss L. Swift, Mrs. R. Hale, Miss Marion Redden. The officers and committee form a council.

The branch will meet again on November 11th and fortnightly thereafter. Two classes will likely be organized, one for those whose knowledge of French is limited and one for those more advanced in the language.

Bulgarian Army Restless.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Nov. 3.—Following a bitter dispute between King Ferdinand and the minister of war, Bulgaria faces a military crisis that threatens to upset the government. The army, for years in a state of chronic dissatisfaction, has assumed an attitude toward all authority which amounts to practical defiance. The officers are encouraged by the success of the military league in Greece, and it is feared that an attempt at a similar organization will be made here.

Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon said quarter-section of land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in section adjacent to a homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
