VARSITY'S ROWDIES

PRESIDENT SAYS THEY MUST BE SUPPRESSED.

Calls Students Together and Lists That Rowdism Must Cease—Social Functions Are Discontinued Pending Pledge.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—A meeting, unique in the annals of the University of Toronto, was held in convocation hall, this morning, when some 2,000 of the men students gathered in response to a call issued by the campus. The dis-graceful rowdism of Halloween was the cause of the meeting.

President Falconer addressed the meeting and suggested that the students of the various faculties at once organize and, through duly accredited delegates of the student parliament, which controls all the faculty societies, giving absolute assurance that they by every means in their power, will discourage and actively suppress rowdism among the student body. Pending such a pledge, the president announced all social functions connected with the university would be discontinued.

Only Five Typothoid Cases. Dr. Williamson, medical health officer, states that of the typhoid fever cases treated here in October only five had their origin in Kingston. The rest of the cases originated outside the city.

Will Keep Them Busy. Boats Can Get All Grain They Can Carry. Special to the Whig. Port Arthur, Ont., Nov. 3.—In the Port Arthur elevators there are about 2,000,000 bushels of wheat and slightly over one million of oats, barley and flax. Fort William elevators contain something over a total of 1,000,000 bushels, those amounts fluctuating day by day with receipts of grain by rail from the west and shipments east by boat. This is regarded as sufficient, with the receipts as they will accumulate during remainder of season, to keep all the boats that may offer to take cargoes, busy for the remainder of the season.

Was Very Weak. Owen Sound, Ont., Nov. 3.—The action to quash the local option by-law was dismissed by Justice Chute, at the county assizes, without calling upon the defence, the case of the petitioner being very weak.

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The custom collections for October for Windsor district amounted to \$15,888.
