### 'T WAS REMARKABLE EYE ACCIDENTALLY SLASH-ED BUT SIGHT SAVED.

Cornea and Iris Cut to Depth of Quarter Inch—What Medical Skill and Diligent Nursing Did.

New York, Nov. 3.—With a cut a quarter of an inch deep across the middle of his left eye, John Roberts, thirty-eight years old, of No. 435 West Forty-fifth street, is one of the happiest patients in Flower hospital, where he told yesterday that he would soon be able to see plainly with the injured organ.

Roberts was told more than a week ago that his eye would not have to be removed, but it was not known at that time whether it would be possible to save the sight. When the bandages were removed, yesterday, for a dressing, Roberts said he could distinguish an object held before the eye.

The patient, who is a stage carpenter at the Hippodrome, was injured October 6th, when a screwdriver with which he was working slipped and the point of the tool entered the eyeball. The cornea and the iris were cut to a depth of a quarter of an inch and the glass extended down into the lower part of the sclera. Roberts was rushed to the Flower hospital, where Dr. R. S. Copeland, dean of the institution, who is also professor of ophthalmology, took charge of the case.

Dr. Copeland drew the edges of the incision together, dressed the eye and placed a nurse at the side of Roberts' bed, with instructions to apply cold applications every minute to allay the inflammation. This treatment was continued steadily for four days and nights. In this treatment to combat the inflammation the cold applications were changed more than five thousand times. Dr. Copeland told Roberts ten days ago that his eye would be saved, although it was not known whether he would recover his sight.

Within the last few days the nurses were told that their unceasing attention had not been in vain and that Roberts would see again with the injured eye. Dr. Copeland, it was said at the hospital, did not tell the patient the good news until yesterday, when the specialist's prediction that sight would be restored was verified with the removal of the bandage. A hand was moved before Roberts' face and he declared he could follow its movements.

Roberts will be discharged within a week; it was said at the hospital, and his sight by that time will be almost normal.

### HAD A NARROW SHAVE.

He Was Crushed By a Backing

Hartington, Nov. 3.—A. Abrams, of Kingston, met with a serious accident yesterday, while engaged in moving his threshing machine from the premises of William Trousdale. The engine became unmanageable and starting to reverse, crushed Mr. Abrams between the cleaner and engine. One of his ribs is broken, two more injured and his right arm badly contused. The accident occurred about 11 a.m.

Dr. McArthur, Verona, was immediately summoned, and attended to the wounded man, who was able to leave for his home in the city on the 3:00 p.m. train. Mr. Abrams is to be congratulated on his fortunate escape from what might have proved a fatal accident.

Freeman's barn the slat broke, allowing a number of heavy corn sheaves to descend on Mr. Babcock, throwing him violently across the wagon rack. Though stunned by the blow for some time, and somewhat bruised and shaken up, he is able to be around again.

### A SCANDALOUS APPEAL.

Supreme Court Justice Orders It Struck From Records.

Washington, Nov. 3.—Chief Justice Fuller created a mild sensation in the supreme court of the United States by announcing that the papers in the case of the Yellow Coplar Lumber company vs. S. F. Chapman would be stricken from the records of the court because of their scandalous nature.

The controversy involves a contract by Chapman to deliver to the company 50,000,000 feet of lumber in Virginia. The court of appeals decided in favor of Chapman, and its petition the company asks a review on various grounds, one stated as follows:

"The opinion of the court of appeals is so grotesque in its conclusions of law, and prepared with so little care and study as to be almost unintelligible, even grammatically, not to say legally."

The chief justice said the papers were "so impertinent and improper that they would be stricken from the docket in order to protect the records of the court from scandal."

### A GIRL FARMER.

London, Nov. 3.—An English girl who has successfully farmed 330 acres in Canada related her experiences to the conference of the National Union of Women Workers at Portsmouth. A lady knightly of Fawley, was devoted to discussing openings for English women beyond the seas.

Tall, slender, and good-looking, gracefully dressed in black and white, Miss Binnie Clark scarcely looked as though she had combined the duties of farmer and housewife, had ploughed her own land, and tended without help of any kind fourteen horses and cattle and a number of pigs through a whole winter.

She is an enthusiastic advocate of Canadian land as an investment for Englishwomen, and is now agitating for the extension of the Canadian free land grant to women. At present, homesteads for women other than widows of the heads of families, are against the law of Canada, though according to Miss Binnie Clark it is the spinster settler who can best find leisure to think and work for the general welfare of her settlement.

"I bought an improved farm of 330 acres and worked it for three years, through good seasons and bad, and at the end of my fourth season I found I had made a cent per cent. profit on the year's working," the lady farmer told the delegates. She spoke of other Englishwomen who have made successful investments in Canadian land, and advised domestic service in Canadian households as good employment for Englishwomen. She described a Canadian dinner party where the English "help" attended in an evening gown, waited at table, assisted by an English youth, the son of a clergyman, man, also in orthodox evening dress.
