This would go to show that the members are taking an active interest in the work. The president, Col. R. E. Kent, was in the chair, and also present were Michael Fowler (Glenburnie), R. J. Baiden (Portsmouth), W. J. McNeil, H. W. Snelling, James Stewart, Dr. J. M. Platt, Prof. J. Macgillivray, R. J. Bushell, Dr. A. P. Chown, David Scott, William McCann, S. N. Watts, S. N. Watts, Thomas England, Charles Friendship, L. Rider, Mr. Packs, and the secretary, A. W. McLean.

For Construction Next Year—Street Paving Committee Hopes to Have Its Report Ready for Council on Nov. 21st.

The board of works met yesterday afternoon with Aldermen Graham (chairman), Kent, Hartly, Hoag and Toye in attendance.

The engineer presented a list of walks that should be constructed next year, and suggested that the board make an inspection at once so that the necessary by-laws could be prepared and things got ready for next year's committee.

Ald. Hoag asked if it was advisable to construct concrete walks, in the outlying sections of the city, where houses were a good distance from each other. Some properties were of small value and it seemed a hardship to charge big amounts for walks.

The engineer said that practically all the walks he recommended were in dangerous condition, but he would go over them with him so they could see for themselves.

On motion of Ald. Toye it was decided to appoint Ald. Graham, Hoag, Free and Hartly to accompany the engineer on a tour of inspection.

Kent asked if the by-law passed at the last meeting of the city council regarding seating of public buildings referred to any of the present theatres. The city engineer had the words "inserted" to buildings hereafter constructed. Under the new by-law all buildings already constructed are exempt from the requirements as to the limit of seats to be placed between aisles.

In reply to Ald. Kent the chairman said that the street paving committee was not just yet ready to report but hoped to do so at the next meeting of the board so that a report could be made to the city council on the 21st.

The engineer stated that the petitions presented to property owners had been returned to him by the canvasser and were fairly well signed but a number of owners, particularly outside of the city, had to be heard from.

Ald. Kent said that as president of the Grand Opera House company, limited, he had been instructed to sign for properties on Princess street and added the company's name to one of the petitions.

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Look After The Girls.

A citizen was heard to remark, on Thursday evening, that he was pleased to see that the local inspectors of the Children's Aid Society were doing such good work in the city, but thought maybe they would also spare a little time in the evening to look after the number of young girls from twelve to sixteen years of age who walk the streets, even late at night being seen with young men, all over the city. The citizen went on to say that this could lead to no good, and if the young girls' parents would not look after them the authorities should step in and make them do so. There are certainly more young girls promenading the streets in Kingston than in many other cities of the same and larger population.
