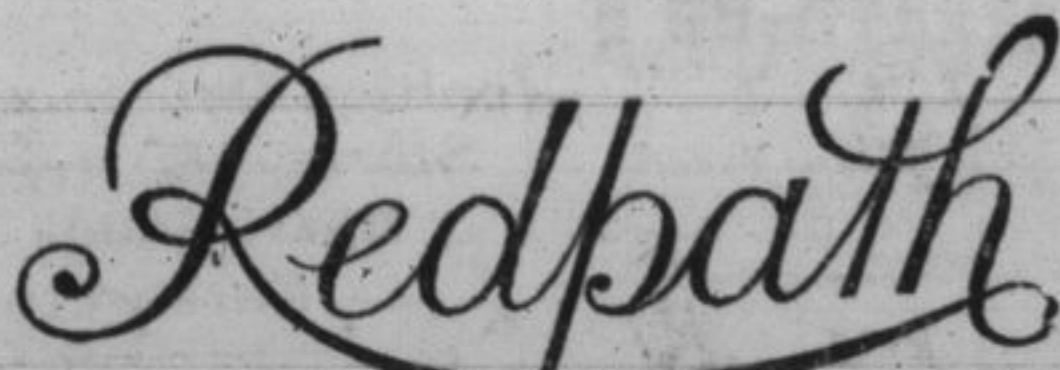

NEW ADVISORY BOARD A POLICEMAN DEAD

EDUCATIONISTS ELECT THEIR REPRESENTATIVE.

Miss Johnston Again Headed the Poll in the Public School Section— Big Vote Was Cast—Only Three Changes in Council.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—The work of the scrutineers who have been engaged for the past week in counting the ballots cast for candidates for the advisory council of education for the next three years, was completed yesterday.

Representing the public school teachers—Miss Harriet Johnston, Toronto; Alexander A. Jordan, Kingston; James W. Plewes, Chatham; T. A. Reid, Owen Sound.

Representing the high school teachers—Stephen Martin, B.A., St. Mary's; Gilbert A. Smith, M.A., Toronto.

Representing the separate school teachers—John J. Rogers, Lindsay.

Representing the public school inspectors—W. I. Chisholm, B.A., Kincairdine, Rev. W. H. G. Colles, Chatham.

Interest centered largely in the public school section, in which the majority of the ballots were cast. Miss Johnston again headed the poll with a plurality of nearly 300 votes.

Though the fact that Miss Charlotte Lovick, Kingston, the other lady candidate, ran, fifth, indicates that the lady teachers did not vote solidly for the ladies. The fact that Mr. Jordan, who made an exceptional run, was a Kingston man, militated against Miss Lovick.

It is believed that the future welfare of America largely depends upon the industrial training of our workers and in protecting them. This paragraph sets forth the opinion of the special committee on industrial education which presented its report at this morning's session of the convention of the American Federation of Labor at Massey Hall.

The report was read by John Mitchell, chairman of the committee. Following an exhaustive review of industrial education in its many phases, the committee recommends: That technical schools be established in connection with the public schools and at the public expense for the purpose of giving supplementary education for those who have entered trades as apprentices; the continuance of progressive development of supplemental trade education as inaugurated by trade unions; that all trade unions, which have not adopted a system of technical education give the matter the consideration it deserves; that the convention request the United States department of commerce and labor to investigate the entire subject of industrial education in this country and abroad.

The feature of the proceedings, this morning, was the address of J. R. Clynes and A. H. Gill, members of the British House of Commons, who are here as representatives of the British Trade Unions. Clynes simply electrified the convention to a high pitch of enthusiasm. The speeches were in a socialist strain. A POLICEMAN DEAD

A CHINESE OFFICER WHOM CRIMINALS DREADED.

He Was a Great Aid to the Police —H. Bousfield, For Criminal Libel Has Been Served With a Warrant.

Montreal, Nov. 11.—Montreal has lost its only Chinese constable. Lee Johnston, He died last night of typhoid fever. He was a terror to the evil element of Chinatown. So far as known he was the only regularly sworn Chinese police official in Canada.

He was engaged by the Montreal police force on account of the difficulty in handling and recognizing Chinese criminals and was a great aid to the police.

An arrest has been made in connection with the criminal libel cases, instituted by the Dominion Coal company against the officials of the United Mine Workers, arising out of the strike at Glace Bay. Harry Bousfield is the latest to be served with a warrant. The third people have been trying to serve him with a warrant for some time and it was only to-day that word was received of their success.

Chief Carrington stated in court, a few days ago, that their agents had been looking for Bousfield at all the likely points in the United States, but that he was not to be found. Since then better success has attended their efforts.

Bousfield's agent, Hon. McHougall, already committed for trial, in Toronto, and learned of a warrant being issued. He came to Montreal, arriving here to-day, and also placed himself at the disposal of the authorities.

Hangman Radcliffe has advised the sheriff of Montreal that he will be here, Thursday, the 15th, to prepare for the hanging of John Dillon, the following day. The scaffold last used at St. Scholastique, for the hanging of Belanger, is now on its way here. Dillon's lawyer is at present in Ottawa, trying to have the sentence commuted, but it is believed here that death sentence will be carried out.

Father Gavagan, the jail priest, frequently visits Dillon, who, however, receiving him politely, manifests no interest in religious matters.

FINED FOR CARRYING ALIEN.

Muled \$250 in Buffalo Court For Offence.

Buffalo, N.Y., Nov. 11.—Because it landed an alien in alleged violation of the United States labor law, the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation company was fined \$250 by Justice Hazel in district court.

The alien is Joseph Story, of Yonge street, Toronto. The government's contention was that he came to Charlotte aboard one of the company's boats to get work in Rochester. He was ordered back and was transferred to another of the company's boats and again landed. Story has been confined for about two months as a witness, but the government had to pay him witness fees for every day that he was so confined.

"Varsity Will Likely Win."

Varsity will likely win the Intercollegiate soccer championship. At present Queen's and Varsity are a tie, each having won two games and tied one, but Varsity has still a game with McGill in Montreal, next Saturday, and should win it. At present, Queen's and Varsity are equal in playing strength, but the Toronto team defeated Queen's early in October, before the latter team was properly organized.

A YEAR IN FORTRESS

ATTORNEY SENTENCED FOR SPEECH IN COURT.

Indictment Charged That He Incited Workmen Against Government in Speech at Trial of Participants in Jewish Massacre at Bialystok.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 11.—M. Gillersen, a leading attorney of this city, has been condemned to a year's imprisonment in a fortress because of a speech which he delivered on June 22nd, 1908, at the trial of the participants in the Jewish massacre at Bialystok. Gillersen appeared at this trial as counsel for friends and relatives of the Jewish victims, of whom seventy-three were killed and eighty-two others wounded. The indictment against Gillersen charged that in his speech in court he had irrelevantly introduced arguments which incited the workmen against the government. The attorney was tried before the circuit court at Gredne, and was defended by representatives of several bar associations, which regarded the proceedings as an infringement upon the privileges of an attorney.
