**HUMANE SOCIETY WORK**

**CANADIAN SECRETARY TO VISIT KINGSTON**

And Speak on Sunday and Monday—He Will Be Present at the Local Humane Society's Annual Meeting on Monday Evening.

Rev. P. C. Laverton Harris, general secretary of the Dominion Federation of Humane Societies, will be in Kingston during Sunday and Monday, and will address the annual meeting of the Humane Society here, which has been postponed for some time in order to secure his presence. As Mr. Harris has been a worker in both the Children's Aid and the Humane Society for prevention of cruelty to animals, his address is sure to be interesting to a large number of citizens, and it is hoped that the meeting on Monday evening will be a large one.

Mr. Harris will explain the new departure which has been recently made in forming a federation of the humane societies of the dominion, which will, it is hoped, greatly strengthen all these societies, and, in time, secure uniform legislation for our dominion.

He will also speak of Band of Mercy work and its importance in training children in kindness and consideration for the lower animals, which often have much to suffer from the thoughtlessness as well as the selfishness of both children and adults. The Kingston Humane Society has done good work here in preventing needless suffering, and a report of its recent work will be presented at the annual meeting on Monday evening.

Mr. Harris will also preach in Brock street Methodist church on Sunday morning, and in Chalmers church on Sunday evening on the social aspect of Christian life, especially in regard to the helpless and neglected.

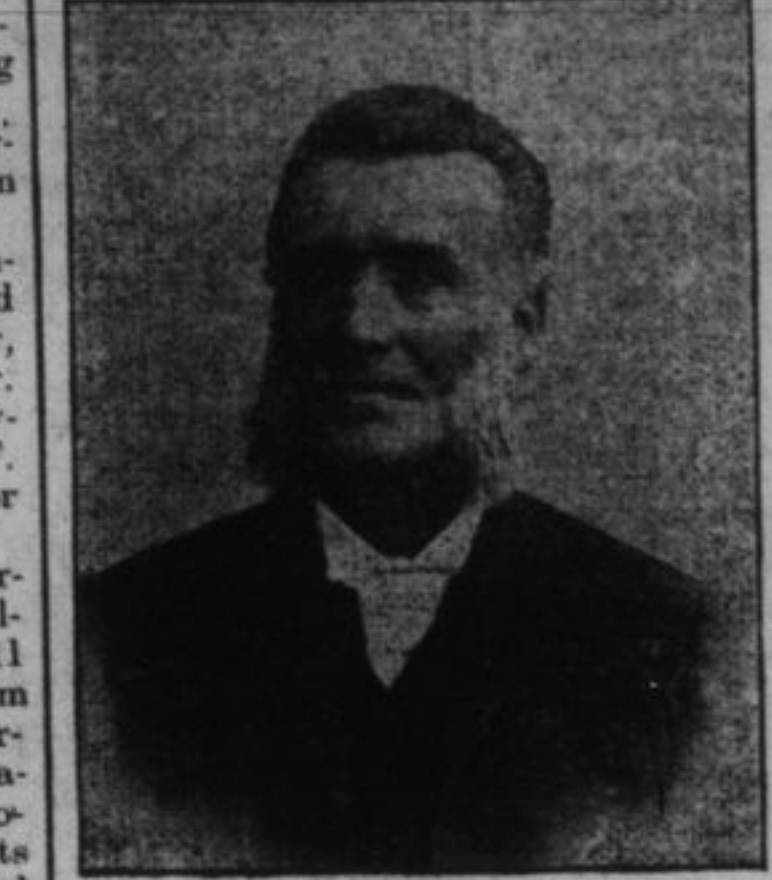

**FOR FIFTY YEARS WILLIAM ALLEN AND FAMILY ALWAYS ATTENDED.**

The Sunday School Has Had Only a Few Superintendents—Names Recalled of Former Few Holders—Who Attend Now.

William Allen, bootmaker, on Brock street, was at the inauguration of Queen Street Methodist church in 1859 and he has been associated with the church ever since.

"I was just shortly married and was going to Sydenham street church, sharing a pew with Sheriff Corbett, uncle of C. H. Corbett, governor of the jail, when it was decided to organize another church owing to the pressure for room for the people flocking to the church during the pastorate of the now sainted Rev. Dr. Douglas. I went to Ontario hall, then called Wesley hall, and secured a seat well to the front. Jacob Bajus, father of the pew in front of me and ahead of him was B. M. Britton, now a justice of the high court. Early in the life of Wesley hall, Mr. Britton brought his bride to it and it was

an incident I recall with pleasure. Among some of those who attended Wesley hall were the late Dr. Michael Lavelle, once warden of the penitentiary, and his sister, of whom Mrs. Robert Meek is the only one living in Kingston; the late J. M. Sherlock, father of John M. Sherlock, the Toronto vocalist, who was for years a member of the choir of the present church; the late Mrs. Joseph Cliff, mother of George and Joshua Cliff; Mrs. R. Barry, whose daughters are still attendants and Mrs. D'Arcy still in active association with the cause."

Mr. Allen and his family have always been zealous for the church's best interest. His children have all been workers in the Sunday school. Miss L. Allen and Robert Allen still share in keeping the school abreast of the times. They are sincerely devoted to the cause, and not only in the school, but in the other departments of activity. Wherever the young people congregate they are leaders and helpers. Robert Allen was a founder of the Christian Endeavor Society of the church, the first established in Kingston and he is now aggressive in the Epworth League, into which the organization has merged. Seven of the Allens, in New York, Toronto, Ottawa, Deadwood, N.D., still hold kindly association with the church, whose helpful mission is so closely interwoven with their being. The Sunday school has been fortunate in having so few superintendents; they can be counted on the fingers of one hand almost. J. E. Clark, B. M. Britton, R. Meek, G. A. Bateman, and E. W. Skinner. Capt. R. Crawford, the stalwart aggressive librarian, is also treasurer of the church.

On February 1st, 1896, the Whig devoted a page to the church's past history. It gave these as the leading

Supply of Wool and Cotton Small-Prices Will Advance.

According to information received by some of the local dry-goods merchants, the reserve stocks of wool and cotton are remarkably low. This, so it is stated, is due to the extreme caution taken by the manufacturers, during the money stringency, and when the sky cleared a sudden demand was made, and there was not enough to meet it. Thus, the shortness of last year's cotton crops tended to make matters worse. In order to keep the reserve, mills were only working five days a week.

Under these circumstances it is almost certain that cotton will go up in price, and those wishing to get in a stock should buy at once.
