**TIED THE VESSELS UP**  
**THE STORM WAS TOO FIERCE FOR BOATS**

To Attempt to Go Out on the Lake—The Steamer Key West is Being Repaired and Will Be Laid Up.

Last night's severe gale, on the lake, was the means of tying up navigation, somewhat. It was too rough for small vessels to venture out and the vessels in port had a great shaking up.

The steamer Jesca is ready to make another trip to Oswego, but is held back by the storm.

The schooner Lizzie Metzner was slightly damaged on Tuesday night, while lying at Swift's wharf. The wind blew a gale from the south-west and hammered the small vessel on the wharf, tearing away the guard on the starboard side, and doing a little damage to the starboard quarter. A few hours' work and a few new planks will remedy the damage. The Metzner is bound for Picton, with 400 barrels of salt.

The steamer Aberdeen was at Swift's, Tuesday night, the wind being too heavy for her to continue up the lake.

The steamer Aletha made the regular trip from bay points to-day.

The steamer Sowards is wind-bound at Oswego, loaded with coal for Kingston.

The steamer Westport cleared for Rideau canal ports, with a cargo of general freight.

The steamer John Randall loaded grain at Richardson's and cleared for Washburn.

The steamer Key West is at the government dry-dock, undergoing repairs. Afterwards she will be laid up for the winter at Crawford's wharf.

The schooner Ford River is loaded with feldspar ready to clear for Charlotte, but is detained by the weather. She may be able to clear to-night.

The steamer Advance cleared for Port William with a cargo of freight.

**TO MAKE NO CHANGE**  
**IN POWER OFFER TO STREET RAILWAY.**

Light, Heat and Power Committee Stands By Its Last Report—City Council Can Do As It Chooses.

The light, heat and power committee refuses to grant any further concessions to the street railway company regarding a new power agreement. It holds to what it has already recommended to the city council, viz., a five year agreement, the city to have the right of cancelling it at the end of the third or fourth year if the condition of the plant demands such a course. This recommendation will be again submitted to the city council and it can do what it likes with it. The committee absolutely refuses to accede to the company's latest offer, as contained in a letter of November 8th, addressed to the council.

In this letter the company offers to pay its proportion of the interest charges and depreciation, in case the increased consumption necessitates the installation of boilers at the plant after three years, and thus guarantee the city against loss. The letter also contained the following: "As the city has had the use of our generator, belts and used in connection with our engine in carrying your day load, thus obviating your operating your large Corliss engine during the day, we are prepared to permit the city the further gratuitous use of this machine, if you maintain it in as efficient repair as when received by you. Of course, if our engine should at any time break down, it must be understood that we have the first call on power from the motor generator set. In return for this concession, we would expect you to protect our engine and apparatus from wind and weather, by adequate roofing, etc."

Elliott (chairman), Carson, Hart, McKay and Rigney were present at the meeting and were unanimous in their finding.

Ald. Carson opened the discussion by paying his compliments to the street railway company.

"I wonder what this company takes us to be?" he asked. "We sat in session from eight to twelve o'clock at the last meeting of this committee, and the president told us point blank that he wouldn't agree to any of the things he now offers to do. It looks as though the company had backed up a bit in its demands. As to 'I propose,' continued Ald. Carson, 'to let this matter go to the people. Let them vote on the question of a five-year power agreement. If the company wants us to buy the road, let the city buy it at scrap, for that is all the president tells us it's worth. I would put two questions to the people—the purchase of the road and the five-year power agreement.'

Ald. Carson declared that it was an insult to the committee for the company to send its letter of November 8th to council over the committee's head.

Ald. McKay—"Where are Aids. Angrove and McCartney. They should be here to give us their views on this new phase of the question."

Ald. Elliott—"Yes; where is Aid. Angrove? He was so anxious to get this matter settled."

Ald. Carson—"The company tells us it is considering the question of making workmen's tickets good from 5 to 6:30 p.m. It should have been big enough to have made these tickets good after five o'clock long ago. It should have accepted the new hour for the labor unions. As to Aid. Angrove, at the last meeting of the council, he claimed to have discovered a mare's nest. He told us that the city had been robbing the company in taking more than \$2.50 a car a day. That's all bosh. If the company chose to pay 1.66 cents a kilo-watt hour for its electricity, that was its own business. It never kicked because it knew it wasn't paying more than it should."

Manager Folger explained that the \$2.50 a car a day clause in the agreement was not workable, because the company got cheap power for other things besides running the cars.

Ald. Carson—"It looks as though Aid. Angrove didn't want us to run this plant at a profit. He should be here to explain himself."

Ald. Elliott stated his reasons for refusing to discuss the company's letter in open council—a letter carefully prepared by the company's solicitor.

Ald. Rigney—"No; not by their solicitor. No solicitor ever penned that letter." (Laughter.)

Continuing, Ald. Rigney asked if the committee wished to consider the amendments suggested by the company.

Ald. Carson—"What's the use of discussing them. They'll just be thrown back again on us by council."

Ald. Elliott said it might be necessary to increase the plant without increased consumption, for the plant might wear out. Hence the com-
