WERE SAVED BY DOG

FAMILY WARNED OF FIRE IN THE HOUSE.

Mrs. Edward Curran roused in early morning by dog tugging at bedclothes and licking her face—Little Damage Done. Brantford, Ont., Nov. 18.—Fire originated in a peculiar way, yesterday morning, in the cellar of Edward Curran, Murray street. While the family slept flames broke out in a chicken incubator which had not been in use for two years. The cause is supposed to have been spontaneous combustion in the inner works of the outfit. The blaze spread rapidly in the cellar and ignited the floors. Upstairs Mrs. Curran was aroused by the dog tugging at the bed clothes and licking her face. She aroused her son, who rushed through the smoke-filled house and summoned the firemen. The actual damage was confined to the cellar, amounting to \$100.

Hamilton Can Get No Special Privileges. Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 18.—Mayor McLaren has received a letter from Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, stating the commission will not grant the city any more favorable terms than those accorded to the other municipalities in the power group. This is taken to mean the city council will refuse to close a contract with the commission, but will give the ratepayers a chance to vote on the matter in January.

SNOWFALL ON MARS.

Prof. Lowell Notices White Patch at South Pole. Flagstaff, Ariz., Nov. 18.—Director Lowell, of the Lowell Observatory, reports the first apparent antarctic snowfall of the season on Mars. The first patch was seen on November 12th, and was small, with a great increase on the 16th. This is said to be exceptionally early for the first Martian antarctic snow.

Cape Vincent Man Leaves An Estate of \$6,300.

The use of all the estate is left to the widow during her life. The real property is then to be divided into six equal parts and partitioned between the six children, Isabel Rynole, of Point Peninsula, and Estelle, Rudley, Ernest and Cecilia Peo, and Lula Majo, of Cape Vincent. One share is to be invested in a house for Henry Peo. The personal property is to be divided share between the five children other than Henry. Charles Armstrong, Ernest Peo, and P. OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The Brandon Shoe company, recently burned out at Aylmer, will remove to Brantford.

Justice Sutherland was tendered a complimentary banquet by the Windsor Board of Trade.

The Toronto Y.M.C.A. will more than double its subscriptions to foreign missionary work.

Two packets were stolen from the mail car of the Canadian Northern near Hartney, Man., containing \$7,000.

The Elmira, N.Y., city hall was burned to the ground, on Thursday, in a fire which started in the engineer's room.

The Montreal police committee will appoint a board of morality to supervise theatres, moving picture shows and other amusements places.

Henry Coleman, Sr., Bellfontaine, Ohio, aged, eighty-six years, who died Wednesday evening, leaves fifteen children and eighty-five grandchildren.

Advices received from Managua state that President Zelaya has practically put an end to the revolution, which is now confined to Bluefield.

John G. Carlisle, the prominent lawyer and secretary of the treasury in President Cleveland's cabinet, is dying in St. Vincent's hospital, New York.

Chief Superintendent Ross, of the post office department, received his I. S.O. decoration, recently bestowed by the king, from the lieutenant-governor.

The Barre Marquette railway company has notified the city of London that it will not ask for a renewal of the lease of the London & Port Stanley road.

William, Ezekiah and Daniel McDonald, brothers, of Sidney township, are under arrest, charged with incest. Their sister is the victim and complainant.

The Iowa supreme court has been handed down a decision, holding that private business concerns, under the Iowa statutes, can legally refuse to serve a negro.

At Cherry, Ill., workmen finished the construction of a temporary elevator, in the shaft of the St. Paul mine, and preparations are made to send fifty men down into the mine.

George H. Stephenson, a lawyer, with offices at 130 Victoria street, Toronto, appeared in police court, on the charge of stealing \$480 from a client, Mrs. Annie Pethick, of 1933 Wilton avenue.

Insurance for \$1,500,000 has been applied for on the life of George E. Nicholson, forty-nine years old, a cement manufacturer of Kansas City, by ten of the companies, of which he is head.

E. B. Devlin, M.P., applied to the minister of justice, to-day, for a respite on behalf of John Dillon, to be hanged in Montreal to-morrow. Hon. Mr. Aylesworth replied that no action could be taken.

A strong deputation saw the government, to-day, seeking an amendment to the criminal code to suppress race track gambling and immorality. Sir Wilfrid Laurier admitted that something should be done.

The citizens of Ottawa have subscribed \$400 to take the band of the 43rd Duke of Cornwall's Own Rifles to Toronto on Friday night, to play Ottawa on to victory at the Tigris-Ottawa football game on Saturday.

Accidental death was the verdict of the coroner's jury in the case of Rafaelo Molinoro, the Italian, accidentally shot near Glen Miller, Rumble and Glover; the men arrested, charged with causing Molinoro's death, were released.

Two unions of carpenters, one which now is in the Federation of Labor, and the other of which is seeking entrance, will amalgamate and enter as one body within a year. In the meantime all law suits and other legal actions between the two are to be dropped.
