DASHED TO ITS DEATH A HORSE RUSHED ON THE RAILWAY TRACKS

At Gananoque Station and Was Killed By An Engine—Schooner Kalkins Has Trouble Reaching Its Destination.

Gananoque, Nov. 18.—Early last evening, Joseph Case, who drives the express wagon for Thomas Baker, while in the express company office, after a deer shipped to a local sportsman, left his horse and wagon standing before the station. Just as he and another man were lifting the deer to carry it out, he heard a commotion, followed by a crash, and rushed out to find the train in coming. In had frightened the horse, which, struck by the engine and instantly killed, while the express wagon was smashed to pieces.
