THE NEW U.S. TARIFF

SIR RICHARD'S VIEW OF SITUATION.

Does Not Think the Ratification of Treaty With France Would Involve Maximum Tariff Being Imposed By U. S.

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—In the senate the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne was concluded by Senator Loughheed and Sir Richard Cartwright. The latter, in replying to the statement of Senator Loughheed, that ratification of the Franco-Canadian trade convention was likely to result in the United States maximum tariff being imposed against Canada, said that the best American authorities were of the opinion that a treaty of this sort did not involve discrimination against the United States, and, therefore, did not necessitate any call for the placing of Canada among the list of nations against which the maximum American tariff would be imposed. However, if they chose to do so the United States would probably be the greater sufferer as was indicated by the figures of trade between the two countries. Any event the policy of Canada should be to regulate her own affairs in her own best interests, and without very great regard for what was done by other countries.

In reference to the Intercolonial railway finances, Sir Richard said that the efforts of the new board of management had resulted in putting that road on a paying basis.

The drawing-room was profusely decorated with yellow and white chrysanthemums, palms, ferns and smilax, and the couple stood in the bay window under a floral belfry with Queen's colors, a token of the groom's college days. After the ceremony and congratulations were over the party moved to the dining-room, which was bright with pink carnations, roses, smilax and the light from shaded candles. At midnight Dr. and Mrs. Sergeant left for the west, and on their return will live in Sydenham, where the groom has been practising for several months. 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JOHN SMITH'S CRIME

HE ASSAULTED MISS ANNIE JAMIESON

Because She Had Refused to Marry Him—He Will Spend Six Months in Central Prison For His Misdoing.

Toronto, Nov. 18.—John Smith, an Englishman, about twenty-six years of age, was sentenced to six months in the Central Prison with hard labor by Magistrate Bennett, on charges of breaking into the house of Mary Agnes Williamson, 25 Ontario Place, and committing an aggravated assault upon Miss Annie Jamieson, to whom he had been paying attention for about eighteen months. Miss Williamson boards at the Ontario street house. She said Smith assaulted her because she refused to marry him.

MATERIALISM IS DEAD

People Are Realizing That God is Everywhere.

Bidwell, D.D., preaching the annual convention sermon in Trinity College chapel, last night, affirmed that the words of the Psalmist, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom," were being recognized more and more in these days as being true. Thinking scientists, to-day, no longer believed, he said, in the self-existence of matter, or of man. The old truth which the ancient Hebrews realized that God was everywhere was now being rediscovered and with its rediscovery science was progressing as it had never done before. To those students who were going out in life, Dr. Bidwell said, that in the measure in which they applied this truth to their life they would find success in business, in the ministry, or in whatever calling was theirs.

The Late Egerton R. Rees.

The death occurred at 3 a.m., Thursday, at his residence, University avenue, of Egerton Ryerson Rees, aged sixty-eight years. Mr. Rees had been in ill-health for a long time, having had a stroke of apoplexy, but was only taken to bed on Sunday. The deceased was born near Cataragui. He was for years in the dairy business. About three years ago he retired and moved into the city. He was twice married, his second wife surviving. Mr. Rees was a member of Sydenham street Methodist church.

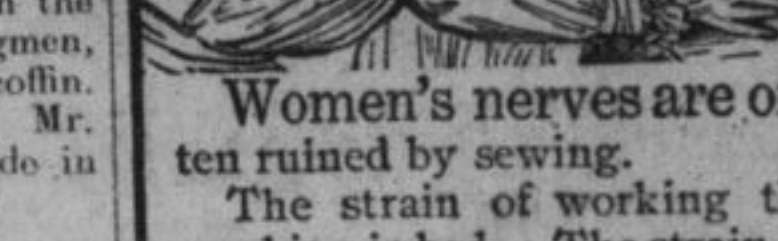
