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#### TIE DIGESTION.

Treatment—Found More Helpful Than Medicine.

New York Tribune. Digestion is seldom improved by the taking of medicines, declares an old family physician. "We all know plenty of old bodies of both sexes who have taken medicine enough to float a battleship—taken it as a sort of pious duty," he says, "but these old bodies hang on to life in spite of their dosing, not through it."

A large glass of water taken in the morning directly after rising and cleaning the teeth are worth all the aperient mixtures in the world. The juice of one or two oranges, taken as long before breakfast as possible, is excellent for clearing out the digestive tract and giving the appetite a fillip. It is well to follow the morning bath with ten minutes or so of exercises which will stimulate the stomach and liver. Stand upright with the hands above the head, then bend down, keeping the knees straight, until the tips of the fingers touch the floor. Repeat this eight times, then put the hands on the hips and bend from side to side. This massages the liver and stimulates the digestion. For breakfast eat porridge, and brown bread and some fruit. Prunes are the best if there is a tendency to constipation. A glass of water taken just before going to bed is excellent for flushing out the stomach and keeping the digestion in order."

### DID HE POISON WIFE ARCHIBALD M'LAUGHLIN IS ACCUSED.

House Burned Down and She and Children Perished—Her Stomach Was Analyzed and Poison Found in It.

Uxbridge, Ont., Nov. 19.—Detective Greer, of the provincial police force, arrived here, this morning, and arrested Archibald McLaughlin, who is suspected of poisoning his wife. McLaughlin's house was discovered on fire, about twelve o'clock at night, on October 29th, and his wife and two little boys perished from what was supposed to be suffocation. The public were not satisfied, and an inquest was ordered by Coroner Bacon. After several sittings the inquest was adjourned to November 23d, and the stomach of Mrs. McLaughlin was sent to Toronto for analysis. From discoveries made, the attorney-general's department authorized McLaughlin's arrest. McLaughlin was hurriedly arraigned before W. Hamilton, J.P., and is now on the way to Whitch jail, in charge of the detective and Constable Johnston.
