### WILL GO HIGHER EUROPE MUST COME TO CANADA FOR ITS WHEAT.

**Biggest Grain Exporter in Dominion Gives Reasons For Prediction—Farmers Hold Key.**  
Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 9.—James Carruthers, of Montreal, the biggest grain exporter in Canada, is in the west to find if the supply this year from the Canadian west will hold out or not. He believes the wheat is being held up, and is going to make a trip through the west to find what the farmers are doing.  
"I feel," said Mr. Carruthers, "that wheat prices are bound for higher levels. I have my belief on a number of points which are now affecting the market. European stocks are at a low ebb. Prices have been so high for the past two years that foreigners have accumulated no surplus, but have only taken enough wheat to satisfy immediate demands.  
"Now, in spite of manipulation, wheat prices eventually come to a supply and demand basis and that is the prime factor we must look at to determine the future trend of the market. The Argentine crop will play a great part. We have seen during the past week what damage reports from that country will do to prices. They have been responsible for a big bulge. Should these reports be substantiated later, it will have a living effect.  
"Then another thing, look at the situation in the States. Europe figured on being able to get a big lot of wheat from below the line. But it doesn't look at present as if they were going to get much. Prices there are at least six cents higher than those which would make the grain available for export. Yet premiums on cash wheat keep well above the December option, with no signs of breaking. This means that Europe will have to come to Canada for her supply and eventually put our prices higher.  
"In Chicago I talked with several big traders and they all take this view. I'm also inclined to believe that the United States government reports have somewhat over-estimated the crop there.  
"And now we're coming to the greatest factor of all, the farmers. They hold the key to the situation and you may rest assured that prices will have to stay at least as high as they are now to make them loosen up."

### IN A CHARMING WAY.

Spanish Life Depicted at the Grand.  
Spanish glitter and life and Spanish love and hate, inconspicuous gaiety and jealousy, were all depicted in a charming way, by the Italian Grand Opera company, at the Grand on Thursday evening. Before the play began and between acts, the orchestra played "Carmen's" delightful music, a happy-adding greatly to the tunefulness of the melodies.  
Carmen, the heart-breaker, and herself the victim of a jealous lover, because of her coquetry, had a heavy and tiring part, but her voice never lost its flexible sweetness, and her grace of movement and her alluring little ways were charming. "Escamillo," the Toreador, Mr. Secchi-Corsi, has a fine, full voice, and received a vigorous applause, when accompanied by the chorus, he sang the well-known Toreador's song, "Don Jose," too, divided the vocal honors with "Escamillo." Again and again were the principals recalled and it speaks much for their interpretation of the story that though the language in which they sang was "not understood of the people," that the audience could follow and appreciate.  
The principals were not the only ones who shared in the applause, but the chorus came in for great praise, also, for its members could and did sing the music of the opera with a fine and tunefulness which left little to be desired.  
The audience was a large and fashionable one.

### SATURDAY QUEEN'S THEATRE NIGHT.

"The Wolf" had its first presentation at the Lyric theatre, New York, where it enjoyed a most prosperous run.  
"The Wolf" tells a story of a girl who was betrayed and sent to her death in the Canadian Hudson Bay country. Her half-brother seeks the man and finds him attempting to lure another young girl to ruin. It happens that the half-brother loves this girl, so he takes her away, but the villain follows; the meeting of the two rivals, the villain and the hero, makes one of the strongest and most interesting scenes ever witnessed on the American stage. The two men meet in the dark and fight for the possession of the girl. The audience hears the two men as they toss and pummel each other about the stage. Finally there is a moan, and the listeners know that death has come to one of the fighters. But which one? The moon creeps up, and the victor strikes a match and holds it above his victim's head. Then comes the great applause, for the right man has been victorious and the play has a happy ending.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., Nov. 19.—A daring faker resurrected an old game and worked it successfully during the past week in a number of the smaller villages in this section and across the Canadian border. The innocents that gathered about his waggon went after the cheap jewelry, collar buttons, pins and cigars. He sold the collar buttons for ten cents each and then gave back the ten cents and added another dime to the pleased purchaser who had placed such confidence in him.  
He continued to work on the credulity of his gathering and wrought up the excitement, until he was selling matches at a dollar each and cigars for two dollars apiece. Men scrambled and pushed through to hand their money up to the waggon artist. When the little barrel he carried was filled to overflowing, the psychological moment had arrived and he calmly stuffed the bills and silver into his various and numerous pockets. While doing this, he took time to drive a big sleath knife into a board at the same time expressing his satisfaction that he was not called upon to use it, because of being granted protection by the village authorities.  
This aggressive and threatening proceeding served notice on the crowd that it would be dangerous to fool with him and most of those who had been stung had already started to speak away, and by the time the victim had concluded to tuck the man, he had disappeared.

### DIAMONDS IN THREE STATES.

Compare Well With South African Outputs.

Maiden Lane's jewelers were surprised when they learned the result of recent prospecting for diamonds in three states of this country, and that in Arkansas diamonds of fine quality are now being found. More diamonds were found in this country last year than ever before. The facts are given in Douglas Stewart's report to the United States Geological Survey.  
Conditions in the Arkansas fields are more promising than ever before. At one point, 540 diamonds were found, of which 505 weighed 217 carats. Three stones which were cut proved to be worth from \$60 to \$175 a carat. These values are said to compare favorably with those of South African diamonds.  
The other states in which prospecting is now being conducted are California and Kentucky, and small diamonds are said to have been found in both.

### Light And Dark Cigars.

A striking example of the ordinary smoker's ignorance on the subject of smokes is the popular superstition that a dark looking cigar is stronger than a lighter colored one. Some strong cigars have dark wrappers, but the dark wrapper does not by any means indicate a strong cigar. Dark, genuine tobacco, if thoroughly cured, is the mildest form. Of course if dark tobacco is not thoroughly cured it will be strong, but so will light tobacco, for that matter. Any cigar man will let you that the dark color is usually, though not always, a sign of a ripe, well cured leaf, which is, therefore, milder than one that is green, though the hue is dark. But when it is known that every manufacturer makes both dark and light cigars and that he uses exactly the same blend of filler in both and that the wrapper only constitutes a small fractional part of the cigar it is clearly seen that the shade of the wrapper has little to do with the strength of the cigar. Ask the dealer for a strong one. He hands out a dark one, and the imagination does the rest.

### Where Women Swim Best.

The Korean women are the best swimmers in the world," said a life guard. "The Korean pearl diving is in their hands. They swim—they don't boat—they swim out to the pearl fisheries of Quelpart, lugging baskets with them. After this swim of half an hour they dive down fifty feet and fetch up queer one shelled pearl systems as big as babies.
