### KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS TENDER RECEPTION TO ARCHBISHOP.

And Present Him With An Address and a Beautiful Cane—The Reply of His Grace—Catholic Students of Queen's Present.

The new home of Frontenac Council, No. 728, Knights of Columbia, of this city, was formally opened last Thursday evening, and the Knights took advantage of the occasion to tender a reception to his grace, the most reverend archbishop of Kingston, and at the same time to present him with an address and a beautiful engraved gold-mounted ebony cane.

The beautifully furnished rooms of the new club were tastefully decorated and a profusion of flowers were everywhere visible. About one hundred and fifty Knights were present, as well as about seventy-five Catholic students from Queen's University. The following members of the clergy were present:—Revs. A. J. Hanley, M. McLaughlin, J. Meagher, and Richard Halligan.

His grace entered the council chamber accompanied by Rev. A. C. Hanley, rector of the cathedral, and Grand Knight J. J. Behan, the choir singing "Vivat Pastor Bonus." The local Knights extended a cordial welcome to his grace and to the visiting clergy and to the students of Queen's.

The following address was then presented by Dr. Edward Ryan:—  
"May it please Your Grace:—From the Council, Knights of Columbia,

feel honored by your presence at the formal dedication of their new home. In opening for our members these rooms, in which we take a pardonable pride, we are but following the aim of our organization, whose single purpose is the elevation of human character, the promotion of our holy religion, and of the ideals of perfect citizenship. Not from the seats of the mighty, nor from out the gilded cradle, have our members come, but from the great army of toilers who, by mental and physical labors, are carving out and growing a nation. So we founded this home that our members, when the day is past, may find succor from their labors, surrounded by influences that will elevate and refine, and in the companionship of those who love naught more than their welfare and prosperity. Neither the cankering influences that trail the steps of youth, nor the corroding vices that lure from the path of rectitude, can reach them here. From temptation and danger are they thus delivered.

For the encouragement, kindly interest and solicitude vouchsafed to Frontenac Council, and to the Knights of Columbia, by your grace, our members are devoutly grateful. Mindful are we that in the days when assistance counted, your grace was near with timely aid and generous encouragement. So in perfect harmony was the incident with your whole life, encouraging, guiding, extending the hand of fellowship to the struggling and the light of your kindly influence to those whom sorrow's hand has touched, who need the kindly word when their day is dark but fellowship dear. To thank you for all these we do now. Earlier would we have expressed our gratitude and devotion for all we owe, but we awaited the day when we should have a home worthy the Knights of Columbia, worthy the honored name of Frontenac, worthy to receive within its portals the distinguished prelate who rules in Kingston's ancient see. We ask you to bless, encourage our members and our order, that we may wear our knightly shield spotless and unsmiled.

For your grace, and to all your holy office represents we pledge loyalty and devotion, and from grateful hearts we breathe the fervent prayer that you may ever enjoy the "peace, which passeth all understanding."

Dr. W. Gibsch then stepped forward and in fine well-chosen words presented his grace with a beautiful carved gold-mounted ebony cane, with the following inscription thereon:—  
"Presented to his grace, the Most Rev. C. H. Gaubier, archbishop of Kingston, by Frontenac Council, Knights of Columbia, Kingston, Ont., November 18th, 1909."  
His grace, in reply, thanked the Knights of Columbia for their beautiful and thoughtful gift. No doubt they considered that in his declining years, he was in need of support. He was thankful for the many kind sentiments and good wishes contained in their address, for he knew these to be from the heart. When admitting the Knights of Columbia into the diocese, the members showed their intelligent Catholic piety by expressing the wish that the inaugural ceremonies take place in the church, with the holy sacrifice of the mass; and now that they are opening their new house they wish it to be blessed by the church, in order that they may always bear in mind the noble objects

for which their society was established. This was the proper spirit. The word knight implies a great deal. It stands for nobility of character, for bravery, loyalty and fidelity to duty; no matter what the sacrifice demanded. Like the valiant knights of old their motto should be "without fear and without reproach." They should be ever ready to don their armour in the defence of their faith and of good morals. Living up to their duty as true knights, their example would excite a salutary influence upon all around them. Concluding he expressed his satisfaction at their renewed pledges of loyalty and devotion to holy church, and hoped that they would long enjoy the advantages of their new home, which he was pleased to see so handsomely equipped. Speaking to the Catholic students attending Queen's, who were the guests of the knights that evening, his grace expressed his surprise to find them so quiet. In his own college days he feared that the students were much more noisy than were the students of Queen's that evening. His grace was glad to know that the Knights of Columbia and the other Catholic societies of the city had always a warm welcome for the students of Queen's who honored them with a visit; they would also be very welcome visitors at the palace, where any assistance that could be rendered them would be cheerfully given.

After the close of his address, which was received with repeated and prolonged applause, his grace imparted his blessing to all present.

After the close of the ceremonies, the students of Queen's University were entertained by the knights, thus concluding one of the happiest events of the season.
