

IN FIELDS OF ART

FRAULEIN STOLLE LED AUDIENCE AT QUEEN'S.

She Showed Many Examples of Old Masters of Form and Color and Also Gave Notable Pictures of Modern School.

In a gently humorous way, Fraulein Stolle expressed sympathy for those who braved the rain and met in Convocation hall, on Monday night. But they needed no sympathy when once they had seen the beautiful pictures which she had brought, and which were thrown on the screen. Though chiefly works of the old masters, there were a good many examples of the modern school, studies of toilers by Millais, who himself knew hardship, gay and light pictures by the light-hearted Corot, and several examples of Burne-Jones strivings after a depiction of the mysterious as he imagines it. The Fraulein has small patience with those who criticize the technique of this artist on the basis of cold fact and thinks they lose the spirit entirely. There were some beautiful pictures by Watts, who has striven to uplift the mass of the people by his art.

Of the old masters there were many Madonnas shown, surrounded by saints and angels, exquisite in coloring, and as the lecturer again and again pointed out, wonderful in the simplicity and in the purity of profile, in the graceful lines of the robes, in their reverent, religious feeling. Fraulein Stolle, a true artist herself, for she painted every one of her slides from the original, not a line or a shadow or a light being lost, pointed out, as each picture came on the screen, some detail plain to the artist eye, but liable to be missed by her audience. To mention all of the paintings, or to even touch on a portion of those shown would be impossible, but special mention may be made of the little St. John the Baptist, of Rembrandt's wonderful head of the old soldier, of the Sistine Madonna and of St. Barbara, the patroness of soldiers. J. B. Walkem, who introduced the lecturer, and Prof. John Macgillivray, who moved the vote of thanks, spoke of the gratitude Kingston felt to the Woman's Art Association for bringing Fraulein Stolle here, and the words were not empty ones, for it was a great delight to all to see the reproductions of the great paintings of the world. The lantern was capitally managed by John Robertson, one of Queen's lecturers.

Did Evil That Good Might Come.

Philadelphia, Nov. 23.—Alleging that he posed as an influential member of a "Black-Hand" gang the postal inspectors have arrested, in this city, 17-year-old Ralph Minnick, nineteen years old, a student at the Drexel Institute, on a charge of writing threatening letters to D. T. Walter, a wealthy Philadelphia, demanding \$500 under penalty of death. The authorities say Minnick confessed that he demanded the money in order to pay his way through college.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Arrivals and Departures of Vessels at This Port.

The steamer Aletha made her regular trip from bay ports to-day.

The coal steamer Isobel Reed is due from Oswego with coal to-day.

Navigation on the Rideau canal is about over for the season.

The steamer Dundurn passed up on Monday night, from Montreal to Toronto.

The steamer Dunellum, on her way from Fort William, with 118,000 bushels of grain for Montreal, is reported on the Niagara river. It was expected that she would be released to-day and proceed to Kingston.

Capt. Dan Kenny has concluded the purchase of the steamer Columbia at Gananoque and intends to install a new boiler and make other important improvements to her during the winter months. She will run on the Rideau Canal, and make regular trips between Kingston and Portland, M.T. Co. The steamer Rosedale arrived at 8:30 Tuesday morning from Fort William, with 72,000 bushels of wheat; the steamer Glenmount is due to-day from Fort William, with 95,000 bushels of wheat; tug Thompson cleared for Montreal, with two barges, the tug Bartlett and barge Hamilton are due to-morrow from Oswego with coal for Montreal.

TAGGED TO WINNIPEG.

Seven-Year-Old Orphan Boy Left on Journey Alone.

When the noon train over the Kingston & Pembroke railway pulled out of station, to-day, it had on board, a seven-year-old boy, who is being sent by the authorities, at the Orphans' home, in the city, to a private home near Winnipeg. He is making a thousand miles alone, and when he left, was wearing two tags, one bearing the words, "I am going to Winnipeg," the other giving the name of the people with whom he is to live. The lad appeared happy and contented. He will be well looked after by the trainmen. The youngster had a good-sized market basket with him, filled with good things to eat.

EXECUTIVE MEETING.

Arrangements Made For the Coming Session.

A communication was received from the Daughters of the Empire asking for co-operation in the building of the new tuberculosis hospital. This was referred to a committee. It was also decided to have new members elected by written proposition. Quite a number of new members were put through last evening.

It was finally decided that the club would purchase a handsome trophy for the club championship, and also individual prizes for the winning rink. The Ogilvie shield will be emblematic of the championship in the points competition.

A COMING ACTION

WANTS \$1,000 FOR HER STOLEN HEART.

Twice Widowed Woman Sues Boston Dentist For Breach of Promise Claiming Heavy Damages.

Boston, Nov. 23.—Mrs. Viola M. Sprague, of Winthrop, twice a widow, has filed a \$10,000 breach of promise suit in the supreme court against Dr. Samuel D. Webber, a prominent Back Bay dentist.

Mrs. Sprague was born in Biddeford, Me., about thirty-eight years ago. She was first married to Charles K. Osgood, a salesman, in 1889, at Dover, N.H. He was killed by a train at Bedford, Me.

In 1896 she was married at Springfield to H. Percy Sprague, a colonel in the United States army. He was also killed in a railroad accident at Bellows Falls, seven years later, when she was a young girl.

In 1904 Mrs. Sprague answered an advertisement in a newspaper for the position of housekeeper and clerk for Dr. Webber. Mrs. Sprague declares that the doctor took her among his friends and to various theatres and suppers, and she further claims that he proposed to her several times before leaving his employ, in 1907.

Mrs. Sprague is a brunette of slight build and an accomplished musician.

TOBACCO IS A DRUG.

Ice Cream is Food, Decides Judge Morson.

Toronto, Nov. 23.—Judge Morson has quashed the judgment of Magistrate Kingsford, who fined W. H. Lee, a well-known druggist, \$5 and costs, some weeks ago, for selling cigars on Sunday. Several medical men testified that tobacco was a drug and was helpful in cases of asthma, toothache and other ills. Judge Morson declared that on the evidence tobacco was clearly a drug. It must be sold, however, for some known ill. Sold for pleasure only constitutes the offence.

To Build One at a Cost of \$2,000,000.

Melbourne, Nov. 23.—The government, in view of the naval requirements, is considering the question of building a dry dock 800 feet and 110 by 34, costing £400,000. They have asked the admiralty to prepare plans.

'Too Much Pigheadedness.'

The street railway company's decision to close down was the chief topic of discussion on the streets, to-day. Its action was generally regretted. The general impression seems to be that the differences between the council and the company could be settled in fifteen minutes if the proper spirit was displayed. "There's too much pigheadedness on both sides," a citizen remarked.
