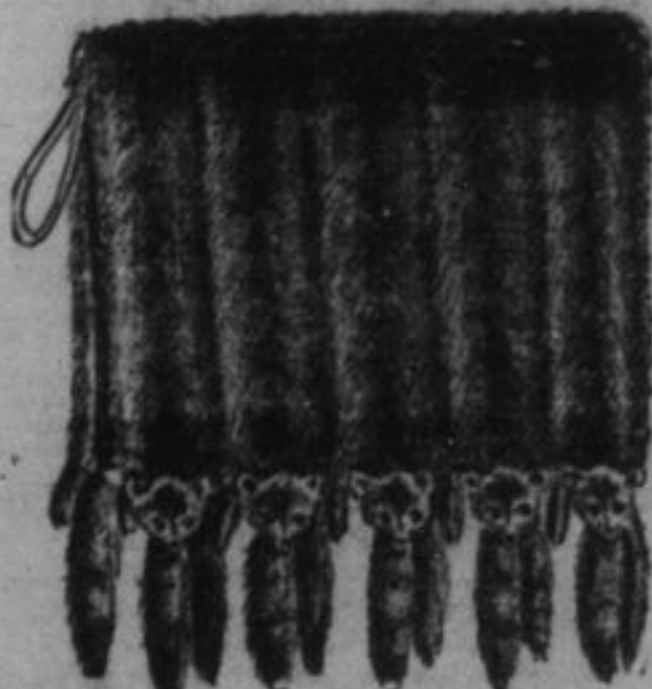

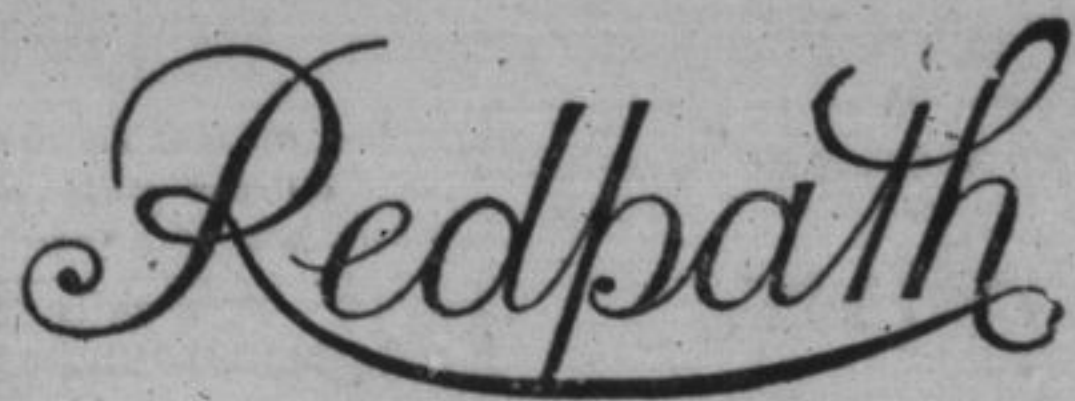

## AT QUEEN ST. CHURCH

### JUBILEE BANQUET WAS A GREAT SUCCESS.

Addresses Were Given By Old Members Who Related Stories of Early Days—Ladies Provided a Fine Spread—A Musical Programme Given by Local Talent.

The splendid banquet held in the Sunday school room, at Queen Street Methodist church, on Monday night, served as a most fitting closing to the jubilee celebration. In spite of the inclement weather, there was a good attendance, and the affair was a great success. It was quite evident that a heavy shower of rain was not sufficient to put a damper on such an event. The ladies were in charge of the tea, which was served from six to eight o'clock, and the menu was a most inviting one. The ladies of Queen street church well know how to provide a spread, and on this occasion they excelled themselves. The arrangements were perfect in every respect, and much credit is due the ladies for the way in which they carried out their part of the programme. The tables were set in the Sunday school, which was very prettily decorated with flags and bunting, showing, also, that the decoration committee had carried out their part in a most creditable manner.

After the tea, an adjournment was

made to the church, where addresses were delivered by the pastor, Rev. Samuel Selleny, who presided during the evening, and Messrs. W. J. Crothers, William Allen, J. E. Clark and Robert Crawford, the veteran members of the congregation. The evening was given over to reminiscences of the olden days, regarding the work of the church, and many interesting stories were told.

During the evening, there was a programme of music, solos being rendered by Mrs. Small, Mrs. J. Evans, Miss May Hinkley and Harold Aggrove. This part of the programme was most enjoyable, and the soloists were warmly applauded.

The proceedings opened with the singing of the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," followed by an address from the pastor, Rev. Mr. Selleny. The latter referred to all the services held in connection with the jubilee, and stated that they had been most helpful, and full of blessing. He regretted the fact that the heavy rain-storm was the means of keeping many away, but notwithstanding this drawback, the attendance was very good.

"It means something to come to the fiftieth anniversary of a church," he added. "You might just as well try to count the stars, or sands on the sea shore, as to endeavor to count all that has been accomplished by this church in this length of time, and the same might also be said of other churches, which have been in existence for fifty years. I believe that the church is the mightiest agency in the world, for the building up of character, the highest type of manhood, womanhood, and citizenship. We, no doubt, have men in this city, as in others, who would stand aloof and sneer at the work of the church, and have nothing to do with it, and yet they are indebted to the church for what they are. Everyone is indebted to the church. I venture to say, that if the churches were closed for a year, the city would not be a fit place to live in. You have no idea of the influence the church has. Think of the way in which it is elevating the people. And should we not consider it an honor to have a share in this work—to be co-workers in this great undertaking, which has for its object, the establishing of Christ's kingdom?"

The speaker then referred to the loyalty of truth. We would fail unless we were true to the church and His principles. The church had never brighter prospects than she had today. The church was not afraid of criticism.

It was pointed out that on this occasion it had been considered better to have addresses from some of the old officials of the church, dealing with reminiscences, rather than to have outside speakers.

The remarks of the pastor were listened to with great earnestness. W. J. Crothers was first called upon and he gave a most interesting review of the church work, going back as far as 1879, when it separated from Sydenham street, and became an independent circuit. He told of the early days when he himself sang in the choir, in the little stone church, and in the later years how a parsonage was erected for the minister, and still later how a new church was erected in 1884, the old one having been found too small. And then he told the story of the burning of this church, one Sunday morning, and how W. J. Crothers was first called upon and he gave a most interesting review of the church work, going back as far as 1879, when it separated from Sydenham street, and became an independent circuit. 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
