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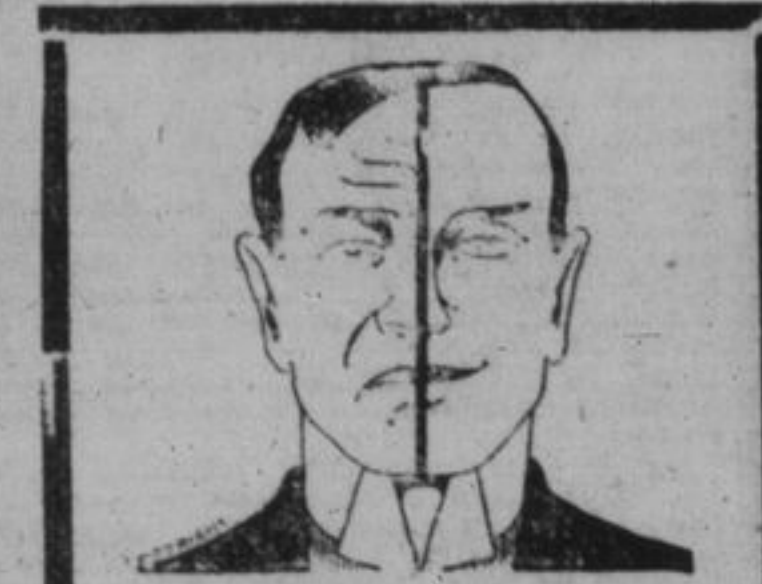

TALK OF RETALIATION.

The Philadelphia Evening Item has been considerably disturbed over the proposal to practically prohibit the export of Canadian pulp or pulpwood to the United States. In one article it argues that the United States paper manufacturers are not so dependent upon the Canadian raw material as some people suppose. But in a second article it is confessed that "pulpwood is vital to American paper-makers under present methods of manufacture", and it is pleaded that there is a big future for both countries, and that it is a serious matter to cause interference with the material on which newspapers are printed. Then a mild threat is used, namely, that the United States might not only retaliate on the paper question, cutting off all dealings between the countries, but cut off the supply of raw cotton for the English and Canadian cotton mills, a trade amounting to some nine million dollars a year. It might sound absurd, says the Evening Item, to talk of forcing Great Britain and Canada to transfer all their cotton plants to the United States or go out of business, but it is not any more absurd than for Canada to figure, by legislation, upon forcing the American paper-making plants into Canada. From all of which it would appear that on this pulpwood and paper question, our neighbors are very much disturbed.

STORY OF A LIFE.

Dr. Gillies has been reciting in the west the story of Jean Valjean, and for the purpose of emphasizing two great and important facts. The one is that "a poor man has no chance in the hands of the law, while a rich man can fight the consequences of his misdoing till he tires the courts of the great American republic." Money has its influence. It hires the men, of experience and genius, who can use all the experiments possible in averting conviction or in mitigating the punishment of crime. Some sentences are exceedingly severe, out of all proportion with the offences, and the sufferers are made to feel that they are the victims of justice rather hurriedly applied. The poor man who does wrong in his distress, or under great temptation, chafes and feels that he is getting more than his deserts. The rich man—not in our country, but across the way—never give up their appeals to the courts while they have the means to engage men to defend them, and persistency has its rewards sometimes. The other point which Victor Hugo made so clear is that the French law was more concerned about the pure spirit of a prisoner than about his reform. Valjean was forced, through want, to commit a crime, and then it shut him up because he was a criminal. Prisons do not reform the fallen. They harden men and make their redemption the more difficult, if not impossible.

CANADA'S DEBT OF GRATITUDE.

Prof. Dupuis' idea is that Canada should pay its debt of gratitude to Britain, and by giving the mother country at stated intervals sufficient money to build a modern war vessel for her own use. What is the difference between giving a Dreadnought or building and giving the mother country the use of it should occasion arise? The professor's opinion is that in the event of war it is doubtful whether the Canadian navy could ever get to the scene of action or inflict injury upon the enemy. Against any contingency on the other side of the Atlantic the British nation is pretty well provided, but the routes of trade would have to be kept open, and the Canadian navy could assist in this as well as protect the country from the assaults of the enemy. The plan of attack sometimes involves eruptions at far distant points. Witness the destruction of the Spanish fleet at Manila by the United States cruisers under Admiral Dewey. In times of peace any craft owned by Canada would be under the direction of some Canadian department. In times of war they would be under the command of the British admiralty. "Oh," some one says, "but did not the premier say they would not engage in any war without the consent of parliament?" Yes, but parliament is represented by the government during the recess, and it could act as circumstances suggest. The words of the premier were used to allay the alarm of those who feared that if Canada had cruisers and destroyers there would be the itching to give it something to do, and it was not desirable that it should be drawn into difficulties which did not immediately concern this country or its welfare.

The appointment of a successor to the late Justice Curran on the bench of the Quebec superior court, is again being discussed, and the name of the Hon. W. A. Weir, provincial treasurer, is now mentioned in connection with the office. The Quebec government sent 700 volumes for the provincial library, Toronto.

BARS FLAGS OF OTHER LANDS IN ONTARIO.

No Stars and Stripes Over the Border Except By Permission of Government.

Waterstown, N.Y., Times. If you have a cottage in the Thousand Islands region of the St. Lawrence river just over the Canadian line be careful about raising an American flag over it next summer unless you have the proper permission from the Ontario government. The Dominion government has barred flags of other lands except by permit. It is said in Toronto that during last summer and the present closing hunting season there have been numerous reports that Germans, Swedes, Americans and others have been in the habit of hoisting their own national flags at hotels, on tents, and on vessels hired temporarily, and that many of these people, under the impression that their flag protected them, proceeded to violate Canadian law by shooting game not in season, running gasoline or electric boats in defiance of all regulations, using fire arms without license and doing other things contrary to law. To avoid trouble in the future and protect many Americans, who have complained of the conduct of a few of their countrymen, the Ontario government has issued a stringent order that no flag but that of Canada or Britain shall be hoisted without government permission on any lands, streams or lakes over which the Ontario government has control, except on the national holidays of the various countries to which travellers or tourists may belong.

AFTER CRUEL DRIVERS.

Must Look After Horses in the Cold Weather. Inspector Arnie, of the Humane Society, is out with a big stick, after cruel drivers, who allow horses to stand around on the streets, in the bitter cold, without blankets. Yesterday, he was out on the job, and gave notice to drivers that they must take care of the horses. A great many of the runaways are caused by horses being allowed to stand out in the cold. The poor horses suffer so much, that it is no wonder that they break loose, and make things lively. The inspector and the members of the society will be backed up by all good citizens in their work. Drivers who ill-treat horses by applying the whip when it is not necessary, will also be attended to. Some complaints have been made, and these are being investigated.

May Have Auto Service.

It is reported that prominent Kingston and Portsmouth residents are figuring on establishing an automobile service between the city and Portsmouth, and also for meeting the trains, in view of the close of the street railway. They are trying to get the big auto car run by C. H. Finkle, of Newburgh, between here and Napanee.
