CADETS WON EASILY

DEFEATED GRAND TRUNKS BY 13 TO 0.

Will Now Meet Dundas For Canadian Intermediate Rugby Championship—Story of the Cadets' Victory.

Grand Trunk had perhaps a slight advantage in weight on the line, but it was soon apparent that the cadets' line was no cinch. Stuart carried the ball to Grand Trunk twenty-yard line. A good kick by McBrearty gained twenty yards for Grand Trunk. Hanford and Rogers got in a mix-up and were chased off the field. It was not the first, and Referee Foster announced that at the next row he would send them out of the game.

In the second half Grand Trunk gained a little ground at first, but good bucking and smart tackling on the poor field soon gave R.M.C. the advantage. Then Ross muffed, and R.M.C. got another point. R.M.C. 7; Grand Trunk, 0.

Meredith was caught for a big loss, but their line R.M.C. worked back to centre. Blue made a dash through, Crankshaw caught him and both were knocked out, but resumed play.

Grand Trunk gained again. Greene's return to McBrearty was stopped. Then Greene ran back a beautiful dash for twenty yards to centre. R.M.C. bucked through until Greene could punt over the Grand Trunk line, and Crankshaw was caught for one point. R.M.C. 13; Grand Trunk, 0.

Greene kicked from centre and McBrearty muffed. Meredith got the ball on Grand Trunk's ten-yard line. Just then time was called.

In Toronto, on Saturday afternoon, Varsity routed Ottawa, by 31 to 7, in the Canadian rugby championship match, and again showed, as it did in 1908, the kind of rugby played in the Intercollegiate Union. Varsity displayed great dash and their halves were invincible. Ottawa's backs were muffed a good deal. There was no muffed as to which was the better team. Once again the rugby prophets have gone wrong. To cap the climax, all that remains is for the despised Parkdale team to march out and put it all over Varsity.
