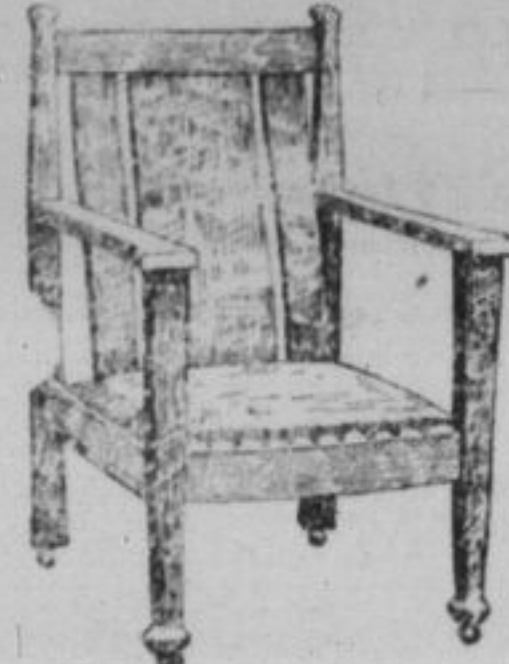

**OF KINGSTON ELEVATED BY LADIES' MUSICAL CLUB.**

A Fine Programme of Well-Rendered Music, Given on Saturday—Folk Music Was An Attractive Feature.  
The programme of the Ladies' Musical Club meeting, on Saturday, was arranged by Mrs. H. P. Smith and Miss Peatrice Tandy before the latter left for New York. Mrs. Smith read an interesting essay on "Folk music," and this was followed by a succession of Norwegian folk dances by Greig, descriptively played by Miss Anna Leslie. Mrs. J. J. Hart, whose sweet and tuneful voice is equalled by her charming simplicity of manner when singing, gave two numbers, "Ah! Love But a Day," by Mrs. Beach, and "Spring," composed by Mrs. W. A. Grant, formerly of "Roselawn."

McClelland chose two of Mendelssohn's "songs without words," "Sweet Souvenir" and "The Hunting Song," for her perfectly played piano numbers, and Miss May Hinkley's songs were the fiery "Scotts' Wha Hae" and sweet "Robin Adair," Norwegian folk melodies, also Greig's music, as before, Miss Leslie rendered on her second appearance and Miss Ardelle Elder sang a folk song, and "I Know a Lovely Garden," by Harlelot, Lang's "Moment de Caprice" by Miss M. **IN MARINE CIRCLES.**

**Arrivals and Departures of Vessels at This Port.**  
The tug Glyde arrived from Montreal with one barge.  
The steamer Aletha made her regular trip from bay points, to-day.  
The steamship Navajo has been laid up for the winter at Richardson's slip.  
The steamer Arabian passed up, Saturday night, on her way to Hamilton.  
The steamer Dundurn passed up, Sunday, on her way from Montreal to Hamilton.  
The heavy wind of last night gave the vessels tied up in port a great shaking up.  
The steamer Pickering, of the Merchants' real line, has gone into winter quarters at Swift's.  
The steamer Advance is on her way from Port William, loaded with grain, for Prescott. The Advance will be laid up in Kingston.  
The steamer Belleville left the government dry-dock to-day after undergoing extensive repairs. She was towed to Swift's slip where she has gone into winter quarters after a successful season.  
The steamer Westmount made the fastest trip on record. She made the trip from Port William to Kingston, and back to Port William, in nine days and seven hours, leaving Fort William on the night of November 22nd, at 11:45 o'clock, and arriving back on the morning of December 2nd at seven o'clock. That is going some and shows what can be done with a crew of union freemen.

**CRITICIZED COUNCIL**

**For Stand Taken on License Reduction Question.**  
During the course of his sermon at Princess Street Methodist church, on Sunday evening, the pastor, Rev. F. H. Sproule, criticized the action of the city council in turning down the petition of the Moral and Social Reform League. He claimed that the question was not being dealt with and there was an outburst of applause during the remarks. The speaker gave it as his opinion that it would be far better to have women in the city council, and they would be able to deal with the question and give it a fair trial.  
In referring to the cutting off of licenses he said that attention should be paid to the big hotels, as well as the small ones, as a great many who wanted to drink did not care to go into the smaller or second class hotels for their liquor, but had no objection whatever to going into the larger hotels.

**DISMISSED THE APPEAL.**

**The Divisional Court Upheld Judge's Judgment.**  
The divisional court has dismissed, with costs, the appeal from the judgment of Justice Teetzel on the action tried by him at Kingston, June 15th last, between Thomas Lee, Lavant, as plaintiff, and D. H. Friedman and Daniel Mulhiller, Albany, N.Y., and C. I. Dubber, Guelph, Ont., as defendants, awarding the plaintiff \$377.13 and costs. The plaintiff sued for judgment on behalf of wage earners employed by the Wilbur Iron Co. Ltd., of which having failed, was ordered wound up.

**WHAT IS COMING**

**WE WILL HAVE STORMY WEATHER CHRISTMAS.**

So Says Weather Prophet, Irl R. Hicks, in His Forecasts For Month of December.  
In his forecast of December weather, Rev. Irl R. Hicks says that from the 11th to the 14th violent winter storms will sweep eastwardly across the country. Fierce gales and high tides will prevail on the Atlantic ocean generally, at this and following December periods. Blizzards from the north-west, followed by a cold wave and high barometer that will reach far into the south, from the 12th to 15th. A regular storm period, central on the 22nd, covers the 20th to 25th. This period is at the centre of the winter solstice. In all reason it will bring heavy winter storms on land and sea. The Mercury period begins at this time, and will increase the intensity and prolong the existence of storm conditions. This means hardship and danger to unprotected live stock and unwatchful men. These storms are apt to continue over the limits of the period in consequence of the Mercury disturbance and the opposition of the moon on the 26th.  
For the balance of the month we are promised storms of sleet and snow, blizzards winds and very cold.

Fully \$40,000 worth of repairs would have been done in labor. However, the dry-dock will be a busy place for the next twenty-one winters.
