A CHARGE OF FRAUD

Tuesday's Court Session. Benjamin F. Detlor, father of the previous witness, was called by Mr. Mowat. When court reopened this morning, the witness resumed the story of renting the mill, of the \$1,300 worth of stock to be put in, and of the ordering of cars from different dealers, and how the price was arranged. Witness corroborated the evidence of the previous witness to the extent that on cars where Clancy paid cash no commission was charged, but when he wanted time, then he paid a commission, and every time Clancy knew he was to pay a certain rate, and not the invoice price. Witness said that when Clancy entered suit, he went to him to see the reason, and Clancy told him he had been wronged out of considerable money.

Witness, in reply to Mr. Mowat, said the first time he knew the invoices were altered was when Mr. Herrington showed them to him. He then asked his son Percy, who said he altered them at Clancy's request. Witness acknowledged that before he first went to Mr. Herrington's office, he had had a conversation with his son-in-law, George Maund, told him what the claim was, and that "it looked wrong." Mr. Detlor also acknowledged that he had said at the time that he could not see how the money could have come in without him seeing it.

William Lyman, another resident of Arden, sworn, said he had also had dealings with Mr. Clancy. Witness said when he got the second load of grain from Clancy he told witness he would have to charge five cents more a hundred as he had to pay Detlor a large commission. To Mr. Herrington witness said he was cousin of Percy Detlor, and also admitted that Mr. Clancy had to seize some logs belonging to witness to satisfy his bill. William File was next called and told of buying grain from Clancy, and he was told the same story by Clancy, about having to pay commission on every car that came to Mr. Detlor.

After this evidence Mr. Herrington called Mr. Clancy in rebuttal. Witness denied positively ever telling any of the three witnesses that he had to pay a commission to anyone, and as to William File, the last witness, he never bought a pound of grain from Clancy from the witness. Witness also positively denied going down to the hotel or ever asking Percy Detlor in Clancy's presence to alter an invoice. Mrs. Clancy was again recalled and said she knew William File, the last witness, and swore she had never purchased a pound of feed or grain from her or her husband while they had been in business. This concluded the evidence.

Mr. Mowat made a fine address in defense of his clients, taking an hour to present his case. After Mr. Mowat had completed his address, the judge said he did not require to hear Mr. Herrington's address, as the case, in his mind, was quite clear without it. The judge, in delivering judgment, said he could not credit the evidence of the defendants, and their negotiations for a settlement were in themselves an admission that they had overcharged Clancy. The witnesses called to corroborate the Detlors were very unsatisfactory, and the best of their evidence was not to be taken as definite enough to attach very much weight to.
