TOOK TWENTY MINUTES TO TRANSACT THE CIVIC BUSINESS.

The City Council Made a Record Last Evening—It Put Through a Lot of Business with Dispatch.

Twenty minutes was the length of the city council's session, last evening, and it stands as the record of the year. In that time the council had its roll-call, heard communications, adopted four committee reports, passed a couple of motions, and discussed a couple of matters on which information was asked. That's "going some" surely. No "hot air" was introduced, and there were thirteen members of council present when the sessions began.

In attendance were: Mayor Couper and Alds. Angrove, Carson, Chown, Clugston, Craig, Elliott, Free, Graham, Hanley, Harry, Hoag, Kent, McCann and Nickle.

These communications were referred: "City" treasurer asking for a new typewriting machine.

George Hanson in the erection of a sign on Princess street.

City treasurer, reporting re pay list of the Dominion Cotton Mill. He found the weekly average for the year as \$109.24, whereas the by-law for exemption required only \$80.

These recommendations of the finance committee were adopted.

On the communication of A. E. Ross, M.D., re exemption from taxes on the public library, that the request be granted.

On the communication from the secretary of the Y.W.C.A., re remission of taxes on their property on Johnson street, excepting local improvement taxes, that the request be granted.

That the account of Ald. Hoag, amounting to \$11, expenses to Ottawa, re Welland canal, be paid.

The board of works report was adopted, including the following:

That the proposal of the Kingston & Pembroke railway company to extend the North street sewer be accepted, the city to pay one-fourth of the cost of construction estimated to be \$400, and to maintain the said extension in the future, that the city solicitor prepare the necessary agreement between the city and the Kingston & Pembroke railway, and that the finance committee be requested to provide the necessary funds.

The water works and fire committee's reports as already given were adopted in full.

Ald. Graham moved, seconded by Ald. Hoag, that the city engineer be instructed to advertise for tenders for cement and tile for 1910. The motion was adopted. Ald. Graham stated that by advertising early a year ago, the city had saved \$3,000 on the cement for 1909. Cement would increase in price shortly, and it was advisable to call for tenders at once.

Ald. Carson referred to a recent item in the Whig concerning an Ohio Saw Factory company, that wanted to locate at Hamilton, Toronto, or Kingston. He thought the city council should send a representative to interview the company and try and get it here. Ald. McCann stated that this matter was before the board of trade. If the industries committee of the council thought it advisable, it would later on recommend to council the sending of a representative as suggested by Ald. Carson.

Ald. Nickle asked when Ald. Elliott, chairman of the light, heat and power committee, intended reporting upon the details of the committee's scheme for inaugurating a light plant sinking fund. Ald. Elliott replied that he intended to go carefully into the matter, and if it was possible he would report to council at its next meeting.
