THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S

D. C. RAMSAY, M.A., GOES TO NEW LISKEARD.

Retires Philosophy Position—Invitations For Conversazione—The Levana Society to Produce a Playlet This Evening.

Douglas C. Ramsay, M.A., fellow in moral philosophy at Queen's, will, with the close of the fall term, sever his connection with the university. Mr. Ramsay has been made the recipient of a unanimous call from the congregation of the Presbyterian church at New Liskeard, and this morning announced that it was his intention to accept and in so doing he would be required to take up the pastorate with the incoming of the New Year. "Dug," came to Queen's seven years ago and during that time has made for himself a name and a fame highly enviable. In every department of university life he has been to the front. In 1906 he very creditably obtained the degree of B.A. One year later he completed for his M.A., the lists announcing him as university medalist in philosophy. This honor was closely followed by his appointment to the fellowship in moral philosophy, whereby he became associated with Prof. John Watson. He then entered upon a course in philosophy, where he won further laurels as a scholarship student. In the intercollegiate debating union Mr. Ramsay was well-known, upon several occasions he admirably upheld the honor of Queen's in bringing home splendid victories. As captain of the Queen's Association Football team, "Dug," was known from coast to coast. He has for many seasons been actively and officially interested in many of the college organizations, among which might be mentioned the Alma Mater Society, the Arts Society, the Theological Society, the Y.M.C.A., the Queen's Curling Club and others. During his sojourn at Queen's, Mr. Ramsay has, by a genial and powerful personality, made for himself a host of friends, both among the graduates and undergraduates of Queen's, who will extensively regret his outgoing from Queen's, the university which he has been so long associated, but will incidentally rejoice in his going to the work for which he has so obviously portrayed an eminent fitness and the best wishes of all Queen's students will go with D. C. Ramsay to the Presbyterian pulpit of New Liskeard.
