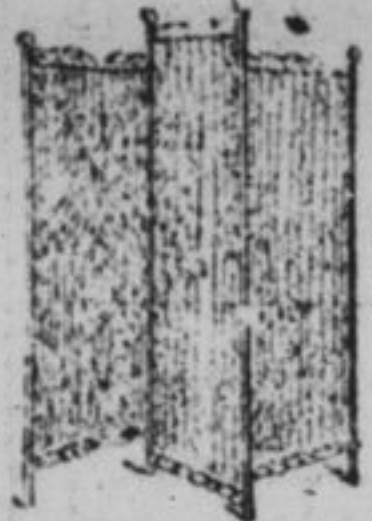

COUNCIL OF WOMEN TO INVITE THE GENERAL EXECUTIVE

To Hold Its Meeting in Kingston Late in January—This Year's Officers Re-nominated For Election.

A general meeting of the National Council of Women was held in the city council chamber on Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Hugh Fraser, the president, was in the chair. Miss Machar, the general secretary, read some communications from the officers of the mother society, thanking the local branch for money received. Mrs. Fraser wanted the expressed idea of the ladies present as to inviting the general executive of the National Council of Women, about ten in number, including Lady Edgar, to meet here late in January, or early in February. The idea was fully discussed, and when put to a vote unanimously carried. It was also decided to send \$25 to the general fund for the next five years, instead of sending \$5 a year. It was thought better, in every way, to send it all in at once, and be through with it. The great work accomplished by the council, on behalf of Mrs. Robinson, the Sudbury murderess, was touched on, extracts from a report that will be read at the annual meeting, being read by Miss Machar. The council was in session at the time of the sentence, and did great work in having the death penalty changed. The main item of the meeting was arranging reports, papers, etc., for the annual meeting that will be held shortly, and also to nominate officers. The officers for the past year were re-nominated. The meeting adjourned after listening to an interesting report by Miss Mackleton, on the work of the council in other places.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Kingston Doesn't Need a Costly Sewage System.

Kingston, Dec. 9.—(To the Editor.)—I didn't know that the Board of Health had anything to do with questions of cost of advisable sanitary improvements. It is the city council that should ask for a report on an improved sewage system. All the Board of Health has to do is to recommend necessary sanitary improvements to the council. If I should say it would cost a quarter of a million dollars to inaugurate what the Board of Health asks the city engineer to report upon, and in order to get the information asked, the engineer may have to take a trip to Europe to study the latest devices, as the city engineer of Toronto did, for 'm sure he won't put himself on record without the most careful inquiry. In my opinion, Kingston doesn't need any such elaborate sewage system as Mr. Thompson suggests. The city isn't half large enough for it. Why the extra sewage from the 1,300 houses that have to install sanitary improvements by next June will be a mere nothing for a harbor like Kingston's, with its two strong currents, to take care of. By all means, improve the sewer outlets, as the health officer recommends, but don't saddle an unnecessary quarter of a million dollar debt on the city.—CITIZEN.

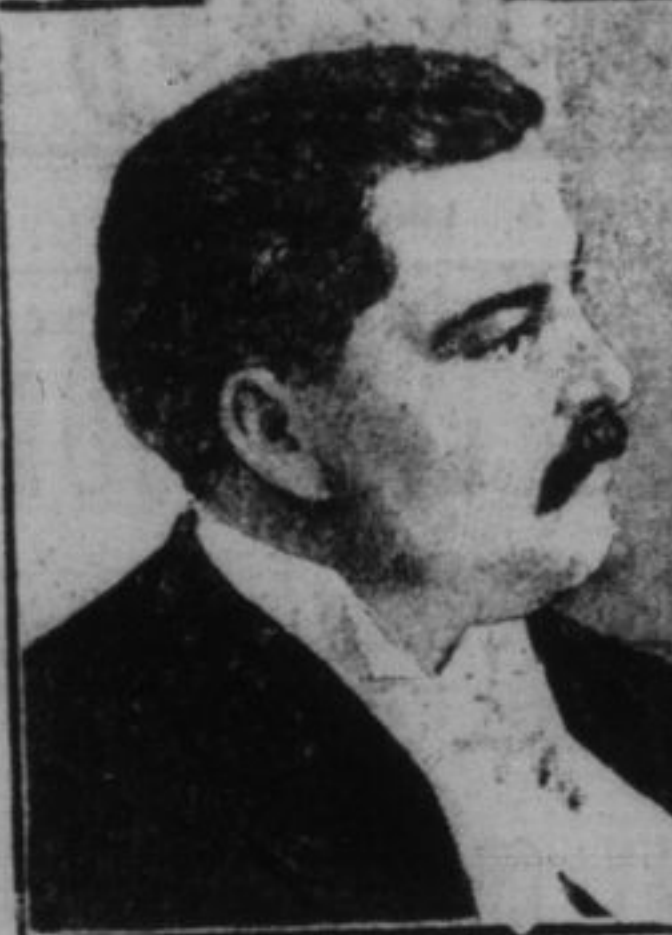

Canadian Postmaster-General Sailed For Home.



LONDON, Dec. 9.—Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, postmaster-general for Canada, has sailed for Canada on the White Star liner Oceanic. MUNICIPAL ELECTION POT.

Hasn't Given Any Sign of Activity So Far.

The municipal election pot has not even begun to simmer, much less to boil. Neither political party has shown the least activity. At present the Moral and Social Reform League has the field to itself, and if it gets the wind it can do a lot of valuable work that will tell later on. Ald. Angrove has been requested by it to enter the field for the mayoralty, but has not given an answer so far, as he has no particular desire to run.

If Mayor Couper enters the mayoralty field again, as it is believed he will, he will be the candidate of the citizens, and not of any particular party. He has been requested by men of all parties to run again, and while he has made no announcement so far it is believed he will respond to the desire of the people and allow himself to be nominated again.

So far as known the likely aldermanic candidates to date are: Sydenham ward, Ald. Hanley, Ontario ward, Dr. A. E. Ross, St. Lawrence ward, Oliver Chown, Ald. Givens, Cataract ward, Ald. Tweedell, Frontenac ward, Ald. Hoag, Rideau ward, E. G. Armstrong, Victoria ward, Marshall P. Reid.

Dr. Ross has not stated whether he will be in the field or not, but he is spoken of as Ald. Nickle's successor in Ontario ward.

Death Of A Little Boy.

The death occurred, on Wednesday night, in the Hotel Dieu, of Norman Harford, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Charop, Pine street, aged six years and six months. The little fellow had been ailing a long time, and succumbed to typhoid fever, and spinal meningitis. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved parents. The funeral will take place on Friday morning to St. Mary's cathedral. The Whig staff sent a wreath to be placed on the coffin of the dead lad, whose father is a member of the composing-room staff of this paper.

Died In Victoria, B.C.

Word has been received by local relatives of the death, in Victoria, B. C., on Nov. 28th, of Mrs. William W. Northcott. Deceased was formerly Miss Olive Cronk, and was born at Kingston Mills, in 1839. Her family moved to Belleville in 1862. She was married there in 1864. Since 1884 she lived in Victoria, B.C. Her husband and five children survive.

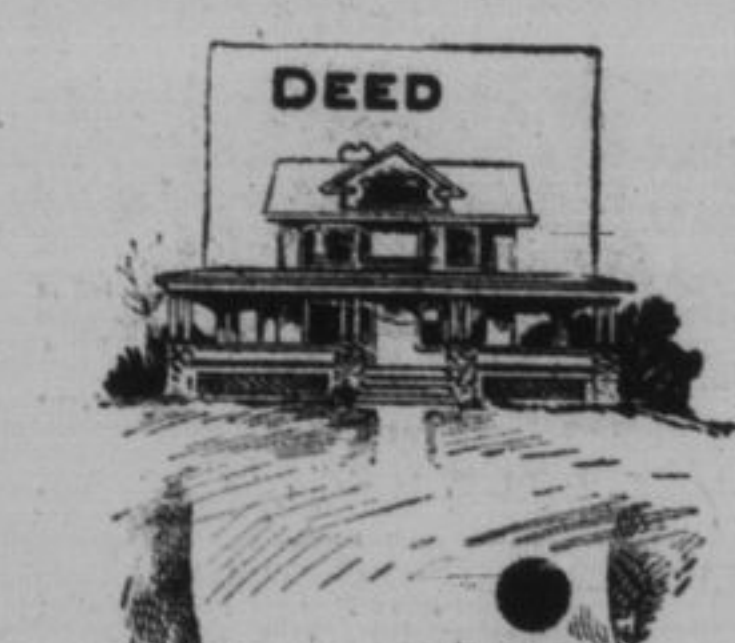
