TO BE TRANSFERRED DILLON'S STAY IN ST. VINCENT SHORT.

Will Likely Be Removed to Kingston Within the Next Few Days So Warden Thinks.

Montreal, Dec. 11.—John Dillon is now safely behind the bars at the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary. He arrived at that institution Thursday afternoon and after answering the usual questions as to his name, age, nationality and religion he was transferred to the "new men" room, where he removed his garments as a citizen to exchange them for the convict's stripes. After paying a visit to the barber shop, where his hair was closely cropped, he was removed to the cell assigned him, where he was served with the usual food of the penitentiary. Dillon will be examined by the penitentiary physician upon his physical condition.

If found fit to work he will be put on the stone pile; if he is declared incapable of working he will be removed from the convict's ward to the hospital, to await his transfer to Kingston. Warden Beruchamp said that he would communicate with Ottawa at once, and ask that Dillon be transferred as soon as possible to Kingston.

KILLED AN OHIO SHERIFF.

Gardener Created a Reign of Terror.

Shreve, Ohio, Dec. 11.—A posse is in pursuit of D. E. Boley, a gardener, who created a reign of terror at Big Prairie, and shot and killed Sheriff Jacob Bell, of Holmes county. Boley escaped from the Madison State hospital. At night he attended prayer meeting at the Methodist church, sitting in the congregation with a shotgun between his knees. After church he went to the home of Roy Lee, who sent for Sheriff Bell. The sheriff was met at the door by Boley, who fired. Bell died an hour later.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

The steamer City of St. Ignace arrived at Windsor, Ont., on Saturday morning, with both stacks blowing off and a hole in her side, having weathered fierce gales.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Arrivals and Departures of Vessels at This Port.

The steamer Advance, loaded with flaxseed for Prescott, is reported to be in shelter at Charlottetown.

Capt. G.H. of Montreal, is here to survey the steamers Keyport and Key-west, receiving repairs, and which will winter here.

This has been a very dull year for the local wrecking companies. Providence has favored the vessels on the lakes this past autumn.

Vessel building will be rather meagre in Kingston this winter. The biggest job is the rebuilding of the steamer Ottawa for the Thousand Island Steamboat company. Quite extensive repairs will also be made to the steamer America.

The steamer Carleton, of Montreal, is at present unloading grain. This steamer was to have wintered at Kingston, but being unable to secure the government dry-dock, will have to go to Ogdensburg, N.Y., for repairs. Several big marine repair jobs were lost to Kingston this winter through the dry-dock being held for the government dredges.

L. L. HENDERSON HERE.

He Says M. T. Company Had a Good Season.

L. L. Henderson, general manager of the M. T. company, is here from Montreal, and will remain till Monday when he goes to Toronto. He and the president of the company, B. McLennan, of Montreal, are paying a visit to the local office and to look over the fleet about to enter winter quarters. Mr. Henderson stated that the company has had a very good season, notwithstanding the summer shortage in grain. The fall shipments turned out quite large. Package freight was better this year than ever before. The record grain-carrying season was two years ago, and next year he expects will more than equal 1907.

Died On Friday Night.

Daniel Anderson, died at his residence, 200 Johnson street, on Friday night, after a few months' illness. The deceased was born and brought up in the city, and for the past thirty-five years had been employed as a machinist in the Canadian Locomotive Works. He was forced to give up active work about six months ago owing to ill-health, and during the past two months his health failed rapidly. The late Mr. Anderson was a member of St. Mary's cathedral, and leaves, besides his wife, four children, Daniel, Misses Kathleen, Sylvia and Neva, all at home. The funeral services will be conducted at 9:30 o'clock Monday morning.
