FRUIT CULTURE IN B.C.

What Will Be Huge Industry In Its Infancy Now.

Fruit culture in British Columbia is fast becoming the most important industry in the Pacific province. Apples, peaches, pears, cherries, plums and every other variety of fruit are cultivated with the most astounding results. Lord Aberdeen purchased the Coldstream Ranch at Vernon, some years ago and is now developing its fruit resources as a large part of the operations of his holdings. His Lordship's twenty-acre patch produced \$10,000 worth of Northern Spies last year. Other equally good results are reported in other districts of the province. One cherry tree at Penticton produced eight hundred pounds of fruit, and another at Agassiz one thousand pounds. What would be the result of an acre of as many such trees as the soil is capable of feeding, can be imagined and calculated.

In Okanagan instances are reported profits of from \$500 to \$800 per acre. At Kelowna, nine tons of pears and ten tons of prunes per acre are said not to be uncommon. Four acres of strawberries near Victoria returned the owner of the land \$2,500 net. Another owner reported 12,500 pounds of berries on one and a half acres, which sold for over \$1,200. Nectarines, apricots, figs, almonds and several other of the less hardy fruits and nuts, have been tried with success. It is contended by those with experience that any fruit or vegetable which can be grown three hundred miles south of the International boundary line, can be produced in British Columbia.

This fruit industry can hardly be said to have commenced in British Columbia. It has just passed that point in the state of Washington where there are now over 100,000 acres planted out against barely 7,000 acres in 1901.

Should Be Linked Up. That Newfoundland should be incorporated with the Dominion as one of the provinces of Canada was the theme of a splendid address given by Hon. A. B. Morin, former Finance Minister and Minister of Fisheries of that colony, before the Canadian Club of Winnipeg recently.

One of the chief reasons for this amalgamation was that of defence. An enemy controlling Newfoundland would also control all the shipping trade of the Dominion. The Government sitting at Ottawa in time of war would realize fully the desirability of control. There was also the great question of trade relations with the United States. Proposals for reciprocal trade had been made on several occasions and these proposals had failed chiefly for the reason that there were two men dealing with the United States, the representative of Canada and the representative of Newfoundland, when there ought to have been but one. There was also the question of immigration to be considered. Canada was spending millions in order to add to her population. In the western colony, there were 250,000 of the best people that the world contained. Why should Canada not make some effort to secure these people for the Dominion?

The speaker gave information with reference to the country in which he has spent 24 years. It had been discussed 123 years before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth. Progress in the country had been slow in earlier years owing to the fact that it had been regarded as a colony which was to be used wholly for the benefit of the Mother Country. Progress for a union with Canada had been defeated in the past for various reasons, but if the matter was now advocated, it was probable that in a few years, the men advocating it would be in control.

Canada at A.Y.P. Near to the heart of the Seattle Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition just ended, stood the Canadian building, holding the finest exhibit of the fair. It was 93 by 200 feet on the grounds and the walls some 30 feet high. The side walls and hanging pillars of the roof and the floor were of a light wood, under it, down to the top of a high wainscoting, made from a great variety of highly finished Canadian woods, were plainly covered with red bunting, over which were grouped or mingled with autumn toned maple leaves (which Edward VII, then Prince of Wales, during a visit to Canada in 1890, adopted as our national emblem) arranged in a multiplicity of fanciful and artistic designs.

To describe in detail the endless varieties of fish, living and dead, the taxidermy in birds and wild animals, the richness of the several mineral ores, the huge painted panoramic farm scenes, the luscious fruits and lighters, biscuits and maple syrup, the oils and petroleum, the well-furnished resting rooms, lined with splendid pictures, and the hundred and one other items meriting notice, would be quite impossible in smaller space than a book.

Canada's Minerals. The richest deposits of asbestos and nickel in the world, so far discovered, are here in Canada; 90 per cent. of the world's total output of asbestos and 67 per cent. of the nickel is mined in Canada. The product in 1908 of nickel alone was \$2,942,834, also 85 per cent. of all the corundum used in mica enough to supply the universe, while the coal areas of Nova Scotia, Alberta and British Columbia are estimated at 100,000 square miles, and the standing timber in various sections of the Dominion total up to 1,500,000 square miles. Nor has anything been yet said of the mines of gold and silver, the mines of petroleum in Western Ontario, or the copper mines of Lake Superior.

Game Getting Scarce. Ottawa hunters who have recently returned from the north, say that game is so scarce that it will be necessary for the Governments of both Ontario and Quebec to adopt more stringent game laws. It is proposed to petition the Governments of both provinces to prohibit the sale of venison and the hunting of deer with dogs.
