## ARE SEEKING HELP

### WOULD EXTEND THE L.V.R. IN N.Y. STATE.

Northern New York Towns Want Improved Railroad Facilities Over Present N.Y.C. System.

Utica, N.Y., Dec. 13.—Northern New York towns want improved and extended railroad facilities. A delegation of men representing the Northern New York Development League are in New York city to ask President Thomas of the Lehigh Valley railroad to extend lines northward from Camden, Watertown, Gouverneur, Carthage, Ogdensburg, Copanago, Potsdam, Brasher Falls, and Lowville are the towns represented.

At present the New York Central has to depend upon its own facilities to handle the service of northern New York. This is inadequate. Freight tariffs, too, are excessive.

### WHY MANY MEN FAIL.

They Do Not Throw Themselves Into Their Work.

"There are three reasons why men fail," said Rev. G. S. Pedley, Woodstock, in First Congregational church on Sunday evening. "Some fail because the task is impossible, as Montcalm before Quebec. He did not fail because he was not strong, but because he was not being could have succeeded when he failed. Others fail because they are the wrong people for the task as Charles I. He failed where another might have saved the cause. And, lastly, many a man fails not because the task is impossible, but because he is the wrong man, but because he does not put enough of himself into it. This is the result of the most failures of life. We do a little and stop, while the other fellow, the last ten minutes, the final pound, would keep us there and win the fight. The beginning is easy, the trouble being near the top, and we do not do all we can, not because we can't, but because we won't."

The above remarks are from a very strong sermon delivered by Mr. Pedley, who chose as his text, "And the man of God was with wrath with him, because he smote the ground three times and stayed." II Kings xiii, 19. He told the story of Elisha and the young king of Israel, drawing lessons that all could understand and feel their power and truth. He told of Elisha's life, how he had seen fine things come and go, had seen his country go down hill, knowing that the prophet said, "I will do it, when the prophet was ill of his last sickness the young king came to him for aid and counsel in his fight against the Syrians. When the king shot the arrows as the man of God directed the prophet said, 'I will do it, when the king had found the man who could deliver his country, he then told him how to smite the ground, and the king smote the ground three times and then stayed. Then was a prophet with him because the king could not deliver his country, but he showed that he wouldn't. He wouldn't put his whole being into it, he wouldn't fight until the last ditch, he wouldn't hang on the last ten minutes."

"It is the little things in life that count," concluded Mr. Pedley, "the little things that go to show how well one will succeed."

At Sydenham Street Church, Rev. Samuel Sillery preached in Sydenham street church Sunday morning, and delivered a forceful discourse on the question of Home Production. In the evening the sermon was preached by Rev. G. W. McColl, B.A., B.D., of Trinity church, Napanee, who preached an able sermon on the subject, "The Authority of Christ."

Catholic Societies At Church. On Sunday at St. Mary's cathedral the office in connection with the forty hours' devotion to the Holy Sacrament was continued. At early mass the members of the various Catholic societies in the city were present and partook of Holy Sacrament in a body. In the ceremony, after vespers, the Holy Sacrament was carried in solemn procession around the aisles of the cathedral by the officiating priest. The "Tantum Ergo" was sung, the long Litanies were recited, the benediction of the Holy Sacrament was imparted, and the service was brought to a conclusion by the singing of the "Te Deum." The altar was beautifully decorated and illuminated. The music was appropriate to the occasion.

Salvation Army Citadel. At the Salvation Army Citadel yesterday afternoon Adjutant Smith conducted the service. After many testimonies were given by many leading members present and selections by the band, Adjutant Smith delivered a practical and earnest address from the 22nd chapter of Matthew, choosing as his text, "Many are called, but few are chosen." Colonel Mapp, chief secretary for Canada, will conduct the service on Sunday next, and will be the principal speaker. Rev. Principal Gordon, of Queen's University, will preside, and on Sunday, Dec. 26th, Ensign Madeleine Wilson, of New York, will be the speaker.

## CAUSED BLOOD POISONING.

Peck of a Hen Caused His Death Was a Pet.

New York, Dec. 11.—As a result of blood poisoning, caused by the peck of a hen on Thanksgiving day, Wil-liam Tucker, eighty-one years old, is dead at his home, in West Sayville, L.I.

Mr. Tucker, while feeding his chickens, held out some food to a hen of which he was especially fond, and her beak penetrated the skin of his hand.

In 1851 Mr. Tucker, who was a Hollander, settled here. Quite a colony of Hollanders gathered about his home, and the settlement was called Tuckertown for years, the name later being changed to West Sayville.

A sad death took place in Stirling on Wednesday, from appendicitis, the victim being a young man named William Watson, about twenty-seven years of age.
