### HE ADMITS THEFTS

#### CAPT. FRANKLIN MARS HIS DISTINGUISHED RECORD.

Sentenced to Atlanta Jail—Prisoner Confesses to Series of Petty Embezzlements and is Ordered to Serve Two Years and Six Months.

New York, Dec. 15.—Captain Thomas Franklin, U.S.A., twice commended by General Chaffee and General Otis for distinguished services in China and the Philippines, pleaded guilty yesterday to a series of petty embezzlements from the mess fund of the West Point cadets, as commissary and treasurer of the United States Military Academy. He was sentenced by Judge Hand in the United States circuit court to two years and six months in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta. His counsel gave notice that he would apply for a writ of error and review.

Captain Franklin had charge of the pay cheques of the cadets at the Point, which he deposited in the United States sub-treasury in this city and drew against for mess supplies. The total amount of his defalcation ran to \$5,630, of which \$4,821 was represented by false vouchers presented for approval to the superintendent of the academy.

#### A BILLIKEN FUND

For Florence Pretz, the Creator of the Famous Little Idol.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 14.—Pretty Florence Pretz, creator of Billiken, "God-of-Things-as-They-Ought-to-be," little dreams that the idol she banished from her modest home at Kansas City, because he proved an ungrateful wretch to his maker, meanwhile bringing luck to scores of thousands of worshippers at his shrine, has a pleasant surprise in store for her.

The ridiculous, grinning fetish will bring recognition of a substantial \$24 for her, if the movement to be launched in Spokane is as successful as its promoters expect it to be.

Arthur W. Jones, secretary of the One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Club of Spokane, which will disband to be reorganized as the Quarter Million Club on the evening of January 13th, is planning a small assessment on the 3,000 members of the organization, also 1,000 candidates to be initiated that night, as a nucleus of a Billiken fund. A committee of 250 will then make a canvass of the homes and offices of lumbermen, mine operators, railroad builders, bonanza wheat ranchers, apple growers, land owners, and others, to levy an assessment of not more than nine cents for every clay idol found on the premises.

"We expect to raise not less than \$1,000 before the close of the campaign," said Mr. Jones, in outlining the plan, "and every penny of it will be forwarded to Miss Pretz, in the event she desires to resume her art studies. The brave girl belongs to us as much as if she were a native daughter of 'the City Beautiful,' and we hope to be able to change her keen disappointment over losing contact of her nation to a joyful realization of things when she should be and prove that after all Billiken, now repudiated, is indeed her god of good fortune."

#### OF THE SPARTAN TYPE.

#### A Mother Who Saw Her Son's Wounds Treated.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 15.—Mrs. M. Dunwoody, wife of a rancher living twelve miles north of Blue Ridge, Wash., proved herself a type of the Spartan mother when she sat by the side of her twenty-one-year-old son Harry, in St. Luke's hospital, here, to watch an operation for a gun-shot wound, accidentally inflicted by his father while shooting rats on the homestead. Previously, she directed the work of building a stretcher on which the young man was strapped and carried down the steep mountain-side to Blue Ridge by six sturdy homesteaders. While the injured man is in a precarious condition the hospital attendants say he has more than a fighting chance for his life, and for this they give all the credit to the brave little woman who rendered first aid following the shooting and carried out the details of bringing him to Spokane. The accident occurred when Dunwoody passed a loaded gun to his son. The cartridge was discharged just as the latter was about to grasp the stock and the contents struck the young man full in the body.

#### CITY BLOCKS BURNED.

Thousands Made Homeless By Fire in Chilean City.

Santiago, Chili, Dec. 15.—A disastrous fire occurred, last night, in the city of Valdivia. Eighteen blocks of buildings were destroyed, and thousands rendered homeless. The loss is estimated at about 7,000,000 pesos (\$2,500,000).

#### Wane Of Lawn Tennis.

London, Dec. 14.—Only 88,448 games of lawn tennis were played in London parks last summer, as compared with 97,305 in the previous year, and quists and lacrosse have also fallen in favor, but hockey and bowls are becoming more popular and the demand for cricket and football pitches is far in excess of the accommodation.

#### Horse Thief Pleads Guilty.

Brockville, Dec. 15.—William McMillan, the Mechanicville man, arrested three weeks ago on a charge of stealing a horse, and who chose a trial by jury, requested to be brought before Judge McDonald. He pleaded guilty and sentence was deferred.

#### Street Comedy.

Paris, Dec. 14.—Consternation was caused yesterday in the Rue Lafayette when an elderly man, who had fallen under a motor-bus, was found by jury, requested to be brought before Judge McDonald. He requested the spectators by demanding his wig in a pronounced British accent.

#### Crab Pots In Church.

London, Dec. 14.—Crab pots, fish boxes, oars, nets and other fishing tackle were used to decorate the church at Port Isaac, Cornwall, for a service of thanksgiving for the harvest of the sea.

### THE SPORT REVIEW.

Interesting News From the Various Sporting Fields.

Scullers Arnet and Barry have been matched to meet on the Zambesi river, in Africa, in August.

The Owen Sound Curling Club has decided to hold its annual bonspiel on January 26th, 27th and 28th.

Manager Frederick Clarke, of the Pittsburgh team, has signed a two-year contract with the world's champions.

Besides the Patrick brothers, Renfrew landed another good man in Edgar Dey, who was utility forward for the Ottawas last year.

At San Francisco, in a Marathon race, Hayes easily defeated Fitzgerald, a Canadian runner, by three laps, and Connolly, of San Francisco, by more than a mile.

Edmonton will play the Stanley cup holders in Ottawa the third week in January. The exact dates have not been given owing to the hockey war now raging.

The New York Herald is receiving bouquets everywhere for the enterprise it displayed in making possible the Canadian rugby exhibition, that created extraordinary interest.

Toronto Telegram: Pretty well divided those Canadian rugby champions. Varsity intercollegiate take the senior; Dundas interprovincial the intermediate, and St. Michaels O.R.F.U. the junior.

There is a possibility that "Jack" Marks, who was a couple of weeks ago appointed manager of the Bradford professional hockey team, will join the Montreal team, as it is understood he has an offer from that source, and is asking \$1,000 for the season.

It is not only possible, but probable, that Canada's champion rugby team will journey to Syracuse next season to meet the University of Cornell team in an exhibition game, one-half of which will be played under Canadian, and the other under American rules.

The Canadian rugby game went to New York, was seen, but did not conquer. And it will never surmount the prejudice of the high-salaried critics, coaches and rule-makers. Thus the only sure method to retire the murderous pastime of Uncle Sam would be for the philanthropists to subscribe a sufficient fund to pension off such men as Camp, Stagg, etc.

Brantford, Ont., Dec. 15.—In sentencing William Truckle, vagrant, who had repeatedly appeared asking for six months, Magistrate Livingston said he would send Truckle to the Central Prison, where he would have to work, and not to the county jail, where it was said the chief occupation among the prisoners was card playing and chewing tobacco.

#### Half A Million Fewer Pigs.

London, Dec. 14.—Resolutions have been passed by the Sausage Manufacturers' Association regretting the scarcity of pigs in the United Kingdom, and pointing out that there was a decrease of more than 500,000 in the number during the past year.

Paris, Dec. 14.—Four brothers were married to four sisters yesterday at Roco, France.

### LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Montreal, Dec. 14.—About 1,500 head of butchers' cattle, 225 calves, 1,000 sheep and lambs and 1,300 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. The offerings of live stock at this market during the week consisted of 3,828 cattle, 375 calves, 1,475 sheep and lambs and 2,000 fat hogs. Trade was good, with no material changes in the prices of cattle, although a few extra North-West steers sold at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb., while the general price of prime heaves was \$7 from 4 1/2c to 5 1/2c per lb. Pretty good animals sold at 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c, and the common stock, 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c per lb., while the lean carcasses sold at about 2c per lb. Grass-fed calves sold at 3c to 4c, and good veal at 5c to near 6c per lb. Sheep sold at 4c to 4 1/2c per lb.; lambs at 6c to 6 1/2c per lb.

Good lots of fat hogs sold at about 8 1/2c per lb.

#### CAUGHT THREE GYRFALCONS.

#### Big White Birds Captured on Limer California.

New York, Dec. 14.—Ahen the Anchor liner California, from Mobile and Glasgow, reached her pier here to-day, her purser, Robert Johnston, had a tale to tell of the capture on the vessel of three gyrfalcons. It was in the worst of heavy weather that the gyrfalcons flew on board exhausted. That they had been long in the air was evidenced by the fact that the liner was a thousand miles off the Irish coast. Though the birds fell quietly on the deck they made a hard fight when the sailors came up to capture them. One, starting to fly away, a sailor took a shot at it with the intention of "winging" it, but the bird was in such a weakened condition that the shot proved fatal. The other two birds were taken alive.

Robert Glasgow, one of the sailors, was bitten in the legs and also in

his right arm in his battle with the birds.

Although white gyrfalcons are none too frequently captured Purser Johnston had the good fortune of getting one on another steamship a few years ago and gave it to the New York Zoological Gardens, where, he says, it still is.

#### Borough In Darkness.

London, Dec. 14.—Woolwich was in darkness for an hour and a half last night, owing to a breakdown at the borough electricity works. All the street lamps were extinguished. The performance at the Hippodrome had to be abandoned, and a meeting at the town hall had to be carried on in semi-darkness.

#### Woman Registrar Appointed.

London, Dec. 14.—The registrar general has approved of the appointment of Miss N. E. Ashford as registrar of births and deaths for Huddersfield.
