## STATE ALL THE FACTS.

D. Marshall, who represents West Elgin in the commons, is consulting his constituents as to what he should do on the naval question. He states the government's proposition (and it is also the position of his party leaders), and adds:

"The British admiralty has expressed the view that from the standpoint of naval strategy direct contribution would be preferable."

The admiralty did not say anything of the kind. It did say this:

"A simple contribution of money or material may be to one dominion the most acceptable form in which to assist in imperial defence. Another, while ready to provide men, naval forces, and to place them at the disposal of the crown in the event of war, may wish to lay the foundations upon which a future navy of its own could be raised. A third, may think that the best manner in which it can assist in promoting the interests of the empire is in undertaking certain local services not directly of a naval character, but which may relieve the imperial government from expenses which would otherwise fall on the British exchequer."

A member of parliament can not secure a test of public opinion by addressing to the people a misleading letter. He may give the people information, and may get some advice incidentally, but before people can counsel them must know all the facts. These facts Mr. Marshall has not stated in his letter.

## JUDGE ON CIVIL MATTERS.

It is important to note that Judge Cannon, who made enquiry into the Montreal scandals, thinks the ward system is primarily to blame for much of the boddling that occurred. Of the revenue of five million dollars, a quarter of it went in wine drinking, in commissions, and other evil purposes, while the remainder was expended in public works, which had no permanency.

Then came the judgment, that the division of the city into wards, giving birth to opposing factions, was the cause of many irregularities, the aldermen, "in their frenzied fight for patronage and control, losing sight of the best interests of the community."

Opinions have differed on this point. In certain municipalities in Ontario, where aldermen have been elected by the city or the electors at large, the political parties made elections very obnoxious. They have not hesitated to carry politics into the council, and wherever the party spirit abounded there was an absence of regard for good management. The first interest being the good of the party there was sure to be wrong doing. That has been the charge at least. In Montreal the race question took precedence of all others, and then the ward cliques got in their fine work, and with consequences which Judge Cannon and the citizens of Montreal generally have severely reprobated.

An election in Kingston just now, with the aldermen-to-be-elected like the mayor, by all the people, would be an interesting event, and put an end to the coteries or cliques which are managing civic matters on the ward plan.

## BISHOP FALLON, OF LONDON.

Kingston has been honoured by the elevation of Rev. M. F. Fallon to the see of London because here he was born and here he spent his boyhood. Fr. Fallon was long since marked out for eminent service in the church. His brilliant scholarship was recognized while he was first a professor in, and then the superior of Ottawa College, and he gave evidence of his successful administration—and the teacher is not always the tactician and master of affairs—when the great university was destroyed by fire. He brought to the crisis his ability, his energy, his untiring industry, and it was a tribute to his zeal that the college quickly rose from its ashes with the promise of increased usefulness.

The call of the church to the office of bishop is the natural sequence to a series of events. The man possessed in a marked degree all the qualifications for the office. They followed his devotion to every duty in every minor capacity in which he was required to serve. Each duty was accepted loyally and discharged with grace. His removal to Buffalo was a sad disappointment to the people of Ottawa whose affection he had won and held for many years. At Buffalo he was found the same conscientious leader of the church that he had been at Ottawa, and it then became apparent that he was destined for higher honors.

The nomination for the see at London was made by the consistory congregation. The bishop of the diocese

of London must be an ecclesiastic of pronounced piety and learning, with the added virtue of complete consecration. With him the call means separation for spiritual service of the highest, the purest, and the most exalted character. Henceforth his will be the care always of the souls of his people, and with Mr. Fallon this will be a continuation of the task in which he has been engaged.

To Mr. Fallon's friends, many of whom reside here, his elevation will afford them sincere pleasure, and in their congratulations the Whig joins most heartily.
