

We visited the county jail and much credit is due to the governor, C. H. Corbett, who is ever painstaking in having things in the best order. We might mention the mprovements in the sanitary line which have just been completed in an up-todate manner. There are at present only eleven prisoners in the jail, a remarkably small number for this time of year, which goes to show that crime and vice are on the decline in
