ITALY'S NEW LEASE.

Her Commerce and Influence Growing Fast.

Perhaps it is not generally known how remarkably Italy's commerce in the near East has grown within recent years. In 1900 her exports to Turkey were valued at about \$7,000,000, and her imports from the same country at about \$5,000,000. Four years later exports had nearly doubled and imports had increased by \$2,500,000.

This development of commerce along the routes once dominated by the Venetian republics said to be due in large part to the initiative of the present king and according to the Atlantic Monthly has brought with it renewed prosperity to the ancient and glorious commercial city.

HEROIC MOTIVES

CAUSED HIM TO BEAR ANOTHER'S CRIME.

Former Superintendent of B. C. Electric Railway Who Pleaded Guilty is Exonerated.

Vancouver, B.C., Dec. 17.—Two years ago two foremen of the British Columbia Electric railway, Maynard and Shorman, were charged with having padded pay rolls with names of dead men and stealing thousands of dollars. Both left the city, but Maynard first made a statement accusing James Milne, superintendent of the B. C. Electric company, of having largely benefited from the crooked work, and of having passed the pay-rolls knowing them to have been doctored. Milne, who has large property interests, was arrested and pleaded guilty to one charge, on which he was sentenced to eighteen months. He has served the sentence and returned to business in the city.

To-day Maynard, who was re-arrested here last night, made a confession exonerating Milne from all guilt, and Milne now says he was doctored under his very heavy work and because he wished to protect Maynard's wife and family.

MAIL FOR FAR NORTH.

Sleigh Starts on Long Journey From Edmonton.

Edmonton, Dec. 17.—Pled high with mail bags containing letters for the land of the midnight sun an ordinary looking sleigh started from Edmonton on its long journey yesterday.

About the beginning of February it will reach its destination, Fort McPherson, on the Peel River, forty miles from that point where the great Mackenzie river descends into the Arctic ocean.

At Lac La Piche three dog teams were waiting for their two thousand mile journey with messages from Fort Resolution. The mail dogs, which the sun does not shine in winter, are "Alek Louit" is in charge of the "trains" as far north as Fort Resolution. The trip down the frozen Mackenzie will probably be made by Indian drivers.

This mail is seven hundred pounds in weight and an electric fan, hand-dried pounds was returned to the postal authorities by the Hudson Bay company, which is sending up the mail and will be held over until next mail which leaves on January 7th for Fort Resolution. This mail does not go through to Fort McPherson, which is served with two mails a year, one carried by dog teams in winter and the other by the Hudson Bay company's steamer McKenzie River in summer.

CAN SPEND \$10,000

IN BUYING CHRISTMAS PRESENTS FOR CHILDREN

His Home Parish—A Noble Gift From Banker Stillman of New York to His Favorite Priest.

New York, Dec. 17.—Through the generosity of James Stillman, the banker, poor residents of the parish of St. Agnes Roman Catholic church, in East End street, between Lexington and Third avenues, will have a merry Christmas and a more prosperous New Year than usual. Before he sailed for Europe, a few weeks ago, Mr. Stillman gave to the Rev. Henry A. Braun, pastor of the church, \$20,000 to be devoted to the assistance of the poor of the parish.

The banker stipulated that one-half of the amount was to be used in buying Christmas gifts for the children of poor families. The remaining \$10,000 will be expended in other charitable work throughout the rest of the winter in such manner as Father Braun may deem most fitting.
