**ON A SERIOUS CHARGE**  
**GEORGE KELSEY ARRESTED AT GANANOQUE.**  
Accused of Committing Assault on Little Stanford Girl—Latter, So It is Claimed Identified Him As the Man—Pinkerton Detective Worked Up Case.  
George Kelsey, about thirty years of age, was placed under arrest at Gananoque, Friday afternoon, on a charge of having committed the assault upon the little Stanford girl, aged ten, near her home on Wellington street, on the night of November 18th.

The local police were notified of Kelsey's arrest last night, and Constable James Craig was sent to Gananoque on Saturday morning to this city.

The arrest was made by a Pinkerton detective, who has been working on the case for several weeks. It is understood that the Stanford girl was in Gananoque on Friday and identified Kelsey as the man who had assaulted her. The prisoner will likely come before Magistrate Farrell on Monday morning.

The prisoner is believed to be a man who was locked up for drunkenness in this city about a week after the assault took place. The Pinkerton detective, so it is understood, has been following up Kelsey for some weeks, a description given to him by the girl having put him on his track. He followed him from Kingston to Gananoque, and has been working on the case all the time. Yesterday he had Mrs. Stanford and her little daughter go to Gananoque for the purpose of seeing the man under suspicion, and the information from Gananoque is that the child identified Kelsey out of about twenty other men gathered about him. It was stated that one form of identification was through a scar on his hand.

It will be remembered that the assault occurred on a Thursday night. The child's story was that she left her home about six o'clock to buy a newspaper on Princess street. Near the Randolph Hotel she said she met a man who accosted her and asked her name. When she told him her name he replied: "Why, I know your father. I will go down to the house with you." He walked to the house with her, so she claims, and that upon arrival there he entered her into a shed at the rear of her home, where the assault took place. As the result of the treatment she received, the child was confined to the Hotel Dieu for several weeks, and for a time it was feared that she would not recover.

Just a week to the very night the assault took place a young man was arrested for drunkenness and held on suspicion of having committed the assault. However, when brought before the girl she said that he was not the man. Several men were in the court room at the time, but the girl could not identify any of them as her assailant.

"I would know the face again if I should see it," she said, "and when I do I will let you know."

It is stated that when brought before Kelsey the girl asked him to show his hands. He showed one, and she said, "No, show me the other." The other hand had been covered with a handkerchief, which concealed a scar. This scar, so it is claimed, was the main point in the identification.

The accused's home is in Gananoque, and he is a carpenter by trade.

**THE LATE MRS. KILPATRICK**  
Died at Her Daughter's Home in Peterboro.

Extremely pathetic is the announcement of the death at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. L. Goodwill, Peterboro, of the beloved wife of Samuel Kilpatrick, of this city. Her critical illness, from cancer, has been of brief duration. A year or more ago she was operated upon and had good hopes of recovery, but last September her condition suddenly grew worse and her daughter (who came here to assist her mother in outfitting her new home on Clergy street), consulting the doctors, hastily departed with her mother for Peterboro, knowing it was but a few brief months, at least, before the end came. With loving tenderness the afflicted lady was nursed and cared for; friends were devoted and kind, sorrow filling their hearts that so crushing a blow had fallen upon a loving family. Gently and peacefully the tired spirit entered rest, which in her wakeful moments she sought. With her loved ones about her bed she sank into the sleep of death at two o'clock in the afternoon.

A brighter, more vivacious and more genial woman Kingston did not possess. She radiated sunshine. Her life was full of good deeds and she leaves happy memories. She was a native of Belleville, Miss. Mina Harold, but had lived in Kingston almost forty years. Her home was a pleasant place to enter; its radiance came from hearts full of welcome and good cheer. Friends appreciated her and found pleasure in her company. She loved the Queen Street Methodist church, entered into its work with earnestness and loyalty maintained its religious standards. Ever active and companionable, ever sympathetic and helpful, ever loving and stimulating in her home and among her acquaintances, her face and smile and sweet words will long be missed. In their affliction the tender sympathy will be extended to the bereaved husband and only living child.

The funeral services will be held in Peterboro on Monday morning and the burial will occur at Catarqui cemetery on arrival of the G. T. R. train on Monday noon.

**BATH ROAD COMPANY.**

Accepts Offer of Township For Purchase of Road.  
A meeting of the Kingston-Bath Road company was held, Saturday, in the office of Kirkpatrick, Rogers & Niekle, to consider an offer made by the Kingston township council to buy out the company's stock at fifty cents on the dollar, or for \$3,900, if the ratemakers of the township agree. The offer of the council was accepted. At the municipal elections in January the electors of the township will vote on a by-law to buy the road. If it carries, and it is a foregone conclusion that it will, the Bath road will be taken over by the township and from that time it will receive a government grant when this is done. Reeve Rankin has been actively at work on this road purchase scheme for the past year, his aim being to get Kingston township clear of toll roads. The Portland and Stratton roads, which also go through portions of Kingston township, will be dealt with next year.

**CHRISTMAS TURKEYS DEAR.**

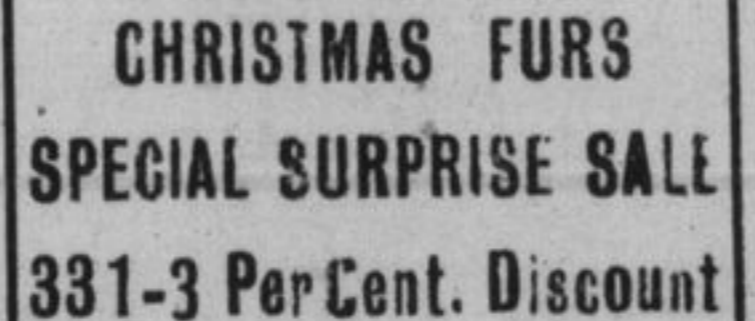
Sold on Saturday Market 18c. to 22c.

"They come high, but we have to have them," say the people. The Whig asked some of the farmers if the price would take a drop for Christmas week, but they all shook their heads, and said they did not think that there would be. Eggs sold at 30c. to 40c. a doz., butter at 25c. to 28c.; lard, 5c. to 6c.; pork, 11c. to 12c.; chickens, 80c. to 90c. per pair; potatoes, 45c.; apples, 8c.

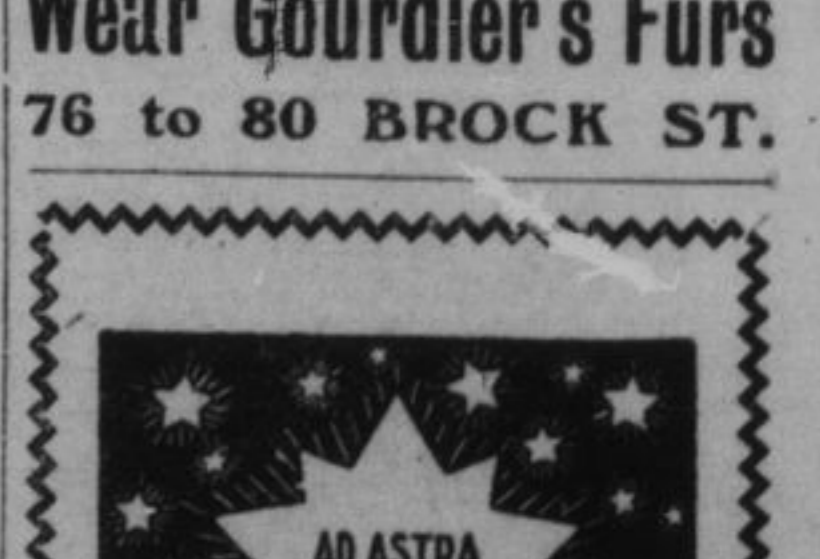
