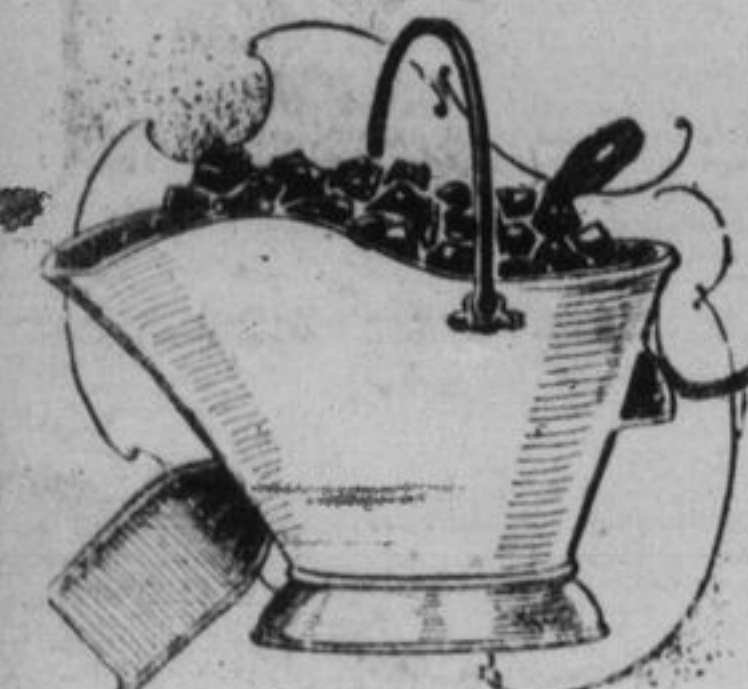

HER OWN EXPERIENCES

LADY DUFF-GORDON ON EVOLUTION OF WOMAN.

Gives Views in Statement That She Changes With Change of Environment.



LADY DUFF-GORDON.
London, Dec. 24.—Lady Duff-Gordon, who, as Mme. Lucile dresses many of the society women of the present day, told a reporter, yesterday, her views on the statement by Henry Arthur Jones that the type of womanhood was changing with the change of environment.

"She believes that man is largely responsible for the change in his woman-folk, and agrees that environment and the times are also important factors.

"Man takes a broader view of life altogether," Lady Duff-Gordon said. "He does not expect his wife to be tied to the house all day long. We live in the days of motor cars and aeroplanes. A man will not want to motor or fly alone; he can't expect his wife, after flying like a bird, to go home and settle down to darn stockings.

"Of course, there are many women who are excellent darning, and whose minds do not rise above their work; but there are many women nowadays who count for something—intelligent women who cannot be expected to be absolutely bound to their homes.

"One of the chief reasons for this change in women is that woman of ten earns more money than a man; she can afford to pay some one to darn stockings.

"The modern girl would not dream of staying at home as her dear old granny used to do. The times have marched along and brought quick facilities for travelling, electric lights, books, papers, and woman has marched along also.

"There is no excuse for a woman being behind the times and remaining in a rut now. She has every chance of being on top.

"The woman who goes on in the same old way on the plea that 'I've always lived so, and my mother and grandmother before me,' is simply refusing to grasp her innumerable opportunities."

Manners Of The Ocean.

Early Earrings
The earring is not a modern invention, for more than twenty centuries ago the daughter of Aristotle wore golden hoops. The philosopher's daughter's earrings were found in her tomb, near Chalcis, in Euboea, by exploring archaeologists, and certainly modern workmanship cannot produce their equal. In each golden hoop swung a tiny dove, with precious stones for eyes and bands of minute gems to give the color of the iridescent breast and wings. The feathers were of granulated gold, and the tail feathers were so marvelously wrought and adjusted that they acted like a balance, as in a living bird, so that the exquisite miniature creatures whenever the wearer moved or laughed or tossed her head would move and balance themselves upon their pendent perches.

Old Hudson Bay Man Dead.
Kenora, Ont., Dec. 24.—James Swan, a half-breed, who for twenty-seven years was in charge of the Hudson Bay company's transport from York factory, died, yesterday, on an island on Black Sturgeon Lake, about nine miles south of this town. He was seventy years old and has resided in this district since 1882.

PLAY SANTA CLAUS.

City Fathers Bring Joy to Widows and Orphans.

Cherry, Ill., Dec. 24.—Nine Chicago aldermen played Santa Claus here and brought cheer to the stricken widows and children of this mining town. With the aldermen came a carload of useful things, and a distribution of the gifts was made from the United Mine Workers' hall, which was surrounded by eager women and children.

Toys for the children were distributed and many fatherless little ones hurried to their homes, light-hearted for the first time since the disaster more than a month ago at the St. Paul mine, in which three hundred men were killed. Clothing and food were given to the widows.

NEW PORTUGUESE CABINET.

Ministers Belong to the Progressist Party.
Lisbon, Dec. 24.—The formation of a new cabinet has been announced. It is composed as follows:

President Beira; minister of justice, Montenegro; interior, Diacosta; finance, Branco; foreign affairs, A. E. Villaca; war, Mathias Nunes; marine, Azevedo Coutinho; public works, Moreira.

All of the new ministry are progressists. The cabinet will reassemble on January 2nd, but immediately adjourn for two months to give the government time for the preparation of a programme of reform, including amendments to the constitution and the improvement of the electoral system.

SUCCESSFUL SWINDLERS.

Netted \$250,000 By Fake Mining Scheme.
New York, Dec. 21.—In the person of Charles Adams, an elderly man of respectable appearance, the police say they have one of a group of mining swindlers who, in recent years, have fleeced wealthy English families but of \$250,000.

It is alleged that when a death notice appeared in the English papers, Adams or an associate would write a letter addressed to the dead man, knowing that it would probably fall into the hands of the relatives, acknowledging previous aid by the address and telling him how to make his fortune in mining stocks and how, in gratitude, he now offered his benefactor a chance to buy choice mining shares.

Sermons From Shakespeare.

A series of "Sermons from Shakespeare" will be read weekly in Saturday's Whig, commencing, however, on Friday, December 31st, owing to Saturday, January 1st, being a holiday.

The writer of the sermons is an author whose books are well known in England, United States and Canada. He has had several published and favorably received in all three countries. He has been a student of Shakespeare's dramas and poems for more than twenty-five years, during ten of which he taught the plays in leading educational institutions. He is a well-known lecturer on various subjects, and particularly excels as an interpreter of the Elizabethan drama. In these sermons he is giving the results of long years of thought, study and teaching. He speaks from knowledge. He brings to his work reverence for the master he is interpreting, and appreciation of the texts selected with enthusiasm and sincerity that every clergyman should show towards scriptural passages.

Dismissed For Odd Reason.

Durham, N.C., Dec. 24.—Eight young men were expelled from Trinity college. Trinity has been free of hazing many years but last night seven boys cast lots with a freshman to see which was to plunge into a cold water tank. The freshman lost and was caught by the faculty in the act of paying the forfeit. President Kilgore decided they were guilty of gambling and the freshman was charged with indecent exposure. All were dismissed.

Frees Woman From Prison.

Galveston, Tex., Dec. 24.—Because he does not believe penitentiaries were intended for women, Governor T. M. Campbell has decided to pardon Mrs. Agnes Goode, sentenced to thirty-five years in the penitentiary, for killing her husband. Five others, sentenced for short terms, were pardoned within the past few days.

IS TO BE EXPELLED

GORKY UNDER BAN OF RUSSIAN TERRORISTS.

They Resent His Life of Comfort and Ease Beneath Blue Italian Skies.



MAXIM GORKY.
St. Petersburg, Dec. 24.—The pleasant life led by Maxim Gorky at Capri, beneath the warm Italian skies, does not meet with the approval of his comrades of the Social Democratic or Revolutionary party.

They resent the manner in which he welcomed a change from his former extreme poverty. He has been arranged for a "tendency to goon living and a love of comfort," and the former cobbler's apprentice, butch'er's boy, kite-seller and tramp, who is now the most famous of the younger Russian men of letters, is to be excluded from the party for which he has sacrificed so much.

Even after he had won literary fame as the "prince of pessimists" Gorky had a hard struggle for liberty and a living. In 1906 he was imprisoned in the Peter and Paul fortress at St. Petersburg, and but for an agitation throughout Europe would doubtless have lost his head. The next year he went to America with a young woman whose presence caused so much disagreeableness to the writer that he had to leave the country. Maxim Gorky's most recent books have all manifested his passionate sympathy with the party which now rejects him.

DEATH OF FATHER KIELY.

Parish Priest of Douro For Twenty Years.
Peterboro, Dec. 24.—Rev. Father Kiely, parish priest of Douro for the past twenty years, died, Wednesday, in his sixty-fourth year. Deceased was born in Prescott, in 1846, and was ordained priest at Kingston in 1869. After being chaplain of the Kingston penitentiary he was parish priest of Kitley, Leeds county, for six years going to St. Joseph's, Douro, in 1890. His surviving relatives are Marsh Kiely, bursar of Mimico asylum, and Sister Mary of the Nativity, House of Providence, Kingston. He was a scholarly and zealous priest, and very widely known and respected. After requiem high mass at St. Joseph's, the remains were conveyed to Kingston, and thence to Prescott, where the funeral will be held on Friday.

FALSE WEIGHING OF SUGAR.

Official of the Arbuckle Refinery Indicted.
New York, Dec. 24.—Another indictment in connection with the sugar underweighing frauds, was found, and it was against Thomas Doyle, assistant superintendent of the Arbuckle sugar refinery in Brooklyn, and charged two overt acts—the false weighing of raw sugar from Cuba. Doyle has not been placed under arrest.

DOCTOR USED JACK-KNIFE.

Amputated Man's Legs to Save His Life.
Detroit, Dec. 24.—In a vain attempt to save the life of H. H. Knapp, engineer, whose engine had overturned and pinned him beneath the wreckage, Dr. W. H. Sweeney cut off the man's legs with a jack-knife, this morning. Knapp died almost immediately after being taken out. The accident occurred at Hillsdale, where a passenger and a freight train came together on account of an open switch.

DECLARED LEGALLY DEAD.

Heirs of Man Missing Can Divide Estate.
Victoria, B.C., Dec. 24.—For the first time in Canada, Chief Justice Hunter granted an order in an application made on behalf of the heirs of Angus McKinnon, timber cruiser, who disappeared on the Skeena river, two years ago, for leave to presume death. This order was made under a new English authority.

TEN SALOONS LESS.

Net Result of the Local Option Fight in Manitoba.

Winnipeg, Dec. 24.—Eleven hotels will be closed as the result of the spirited fight which was concluded on local option, and one which was formerly closed will be allowed to reopen. The net gain in reform to the temperance cause is that the province will contain ten fewer hotels this year than last year. The total number of business houses which were attacked in the campaign was thirty-four and twenty-three of those will remain open for at least another year. The number of municipalities carried by each side is about equal, but several of those in which local option was victorious are places which do not now have liquor licenses.

\$750,000 CHRISTMAS GIFT.

Pearl Necklaces Purchased For Mrs. Widener.
Philadelphia, Dec. 24.—It is reported here that George D. Widener, the Philadelphia capitalist, purchased in New York a string of pearls valued at \$750,000 as a Christmas gift for Mrs. Widener. The work of gathering the pearls, it is said, has taken many months. Mrs. Widener now owns a rope of pearls valued at \$250,000. The \$750,000 necklace will make her the possessor of \$1,000,000 worth of pearls.

DIVIDEND OF \$300 A SHARE.

Wells-Fargo Capital Stock Increased to \$24,000,000.
New York, Dec. 24.—Stockholders of Wells, Fargo & Co. ratified at a special meeting the proposal to increase the capital stock from \$8,000,000 to \$24,000,000. With the increase there will be paid to stockholders a dividend of \$300 a share out of the accumulated surplus. The \$16,000,000 of new stock will be offered for subscription to shareholders pro rata at par in a proportion of two shares of new stock for one of old.
