## WAS A BUSY BURGLAR

ENTERED SIX PLACES IN THE ONE NIGHT.

Joseph Twamley, Was Brought to the Penitentiary, to Serve Term of Ten Years—Was Captured Just As He Was Leaving For the States.

Sheriff Thomas Magwood, of Stratford, arrived in the city, yesterday afternoon, with a prisoner, named Joseph Twamley, who was sentenced by Magistrate O'Loane, in that city, to ten years in the penitentiary, for committing several daring robberies. He has served time before, for theft.

On Thursday night, of last week, Twamley burglarized no less than six places in Stratford. The places entered were the Coghill clothing factory, Caspar Schneider's coal shed, Borland Sulky and Cart company, the separate school, and Deacon & Trow's coal and wood office. He was captured with all his booty, while at the station, ready to depart on a train for Port Huron, Mich. He was given swift justice.

The heavy sentence came as a result of enquiries which were made. It was found by the magistrate, that previous arrests and sentences had appeared to have no effect upon him. The prisoner had no control over himself, in the matter of right and wrong. The magistrate imposed the heavy sentence, stating that this could be materially lessened by good conduct, and, in fact, might be reduced to half. On one occasion, the accused was sentenced to three years, at Goderich, Ont.

The prisoner did not expect such a heavy sentence, but, nevertheless, took it calmly and indifferently.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### Question of Difference in Steamboat Salaries.

Wolfe Island, Dec. 23.—(To the Editor): Allow me space in your valuable paper for a few lines in regard to a question that has been raised by a number of the ratepayers of the township of Wolfe Island, and that is with reference to the salary received by the engineer and captain of the steamer Wolfe Islander. I, like the others, interested in this matter, fail to understand why there is a difference of \$16.66 a month in favor of the engineer. Is this engine of some complicated type requiring an expert to operate it, thereby giving him the honor of drawing more pay than even the captain, who has charge of the entire boat, the work of the crew, the safe and careful carriage of the different freight, and, most important, the responsibility of the thousands of passengers that come under his care during the season of navigation. An engineer has a special duty to perform, and that only, and he is not confronted with the 101 different questions that have to be considered by the captain.

I consider this important matter should be laid before the new council of 1910, and given due consideration. Aside from the current value of the difference in salary, the wages the captain receives should correspond with the position he holds, and as he is at the head of the list, he should be paid accordingly, and in this case he should be given the difference, and placed on equal terms with the engineer, or given the increase that his situation demands.

I am not speaking entirely in behalf of our present competent commander of the steamer Wolfe Islander, although his good services would fully warrant my doing so, but in behalf of his successors, should they be sooner or later. I trust no offence has been apparent in my suggestion.—HATLEY PAYER.
