Infallible Cure For Cold.

A French physician has been writing in one of the Paris papers about a cure for colds which he says is very old, but which a long time ago fell into disuse and was practically forgotten. It is a very simple remedy, the only requirement being that the patient refrain from all liquids for a period of from twenty-four to forty-eight hours. A spoonful of tea or coffee may be taken at meals and a small glass of water at bedtime, if thirst is very great. But it is much better to do without all liquids, if possible. It is not necessary, says the physician, to remain indoors while the cure is being tried—in fact, he recommends that the patient get out of doors and breathe the fresh air. He claims that the "dry cure" is infallible.

The Very Latest Cutled From All Over The World.

Cardinal Francis Satolli's condition grows constantly worse. Cardinal Satolli is suffering from nephritis and a complication of blood-poisoning.

While driving home in a wagon with Christmas gifts for their two children, William Payne and his wife, Hamilton, Ohio, were killed by a traction car.

At Montgomery, Center, Vt., Nelson Hall & Co., butter tub and sugar pail plant, was burned, on Saturday, 11th, causing a loss estimated at \$100,000.

R. J. Botterill, of Gainsboro, Lincoln county, is suing for divorce from his wife, Maria Fisher Botterill, at present residing at Niagara Falls, on the usual grounds.

Constable Fespin, Hagersville, was committed for trial by Magistrates Howard and Crozier, on charges of theft from Amias and Hewitt's seed store.

D. Thomas, a miner at Hymetia, Ind., was sentenced to thirty days in jail for killing a mule. Thomas became angry at the mule in the mine and struck it with a pick.

The medical building at the State University, Minneapolis, was burned Saturday night, causing a loss of \$75,000. The fire was probably due to defective electric wiring.

The order-in-council of September, 1908, imposing a tax of fifty cents per gallon on all ale, porter and beer imported into the Yukon territory from any foreign country, has been rescinded.

Dr. Thomas J. Janssen, the famous Roumanian surgeon, left Rochester, Minn., on Friday night, for Bucharest, whence he received a cablegram announcing the critical illness of his father.

The supreme court has restored the judgment of the court of review, disqualifying the Montreal finance committee for voting the expense of Mayor Payette and the city clerk on the trip to Paris. The city is in financial straits in consequence.
