A WOMAN RIVAL

BLAMED FOR CAUSING DEATH OF LOS ANGELES GIRL.

Miss Bessie Priest Died of Poisoning After an Illness of Twenty Days—Before Being Taken Ill She Had Taken Dinner With Her Rival.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 31.—In the bell that her eighteen-year-old daughter, Bessie May Priest, was poisoned, Mrs. Jennie Priest has asked the district attorney to investigate the death of the young woman. It is alleged by the mother that Miss Priest was engaged to Harry Sayre, a Newark, N.J., millionaire's son, and that she had a woman rival. Search is being made for the woman. Miss Priest died in Glendale on Christmas eve, after an illness lasting twenty days.
Five physicians who attended her agreed that death was due to poisoning. Two diagnosed the malady as ptomaine poisoning, a third as "ancient poisoning." The others have not ventured an opinion. It has been learned that Miss Priest was the guest of her supposed rival at a dinner in a restaurant, and that she became violently ill immediately afterwards. In her delirium she constantly accused the woman with whom she had dined, and during lucid periods she exhibited letters from Mr. Sayre in which he is alleged to have warned her against her alleged rival, though no reason was given for his fears.

SHOT IN BACK OF HEAD.

Girl Says George Emmett Did the Shooting.

Winnipeg, Dec. 31.—George Emmett was charged before Magistrate Daly with attempting to murder Bertha McLean, his sweetheart, and afterwards attempting to commit suicide. He was committed for trial at the assizes. The case is a most remarkable one in many respects. The girl was found in a dazed condition with a bullet wound in her temple, while Emmett had three wounds, all in the back of the head. Three doctors declare they could not have been self-inflicted, but the girl maintains that Emmett did the shooting.

DOCTOR PRICKED HIS THUMB.

Died of Blood Poisoning a Few Days After.

North Hampton, Mass., Dec. 31.—A small cut accidentally inflicted on the thumb on December 19th, resulted in the death from blood-poisoning yesterday afternoon, of Dr. Alfred H. Hoadley. Dr. Hoadley had just dressed a wound for a patient at the Clark Home for the Deaf, when he accidentally pricked his thumb with scissors he had used. He was fifty-four years old, and is survived by a wife and two children.

INSTINCT AND REASON.

An Interesting Illustration of the Two Traits.

An illustration showing the difference between instinct and reason in monkeys came under the observation of David Starr Jordan, the famous naturalist. At one time he had two lively Macacus monkeys called Bob and Jacko. These were nut and fruit eating monkeys and instinctively knew just how to crack nuts and peel fruits. At the same time he had a baby monkey, Mono, of a kind that had the egg eating instinct. But Mono had never yet seen an egg.
To each of the three monkey Dr. Jordan gave an egg, the first that any of them had ever seen. Baby Mono, descended from egg eating ancestors, handled his egg with all the inherited expertness of a long developed instinct. He cracked it with his upper teeth, making a hole in it, then, holding the eggshell up to the light and seeing there was no longer anything in it, he threw it away. All this he did mechanically, automatically and just as well with the first egg as with any other he afterwards had. And all eggs since given him he has treated in the same way.
The monkey Bob took his egg for some kind of nut. He broke it with his teeth and tried to pull off the shell. When the inside ran out and fell on the ground he looked at it for a moment in bewilderment, then with both hands scooped up the yolk and the sand mixed with it and swallowed it. Then he stuffed the shell into his mouth. This act was not instinct; it was reason. He was not familiar with inherited instinct with eggs. He would handle one better next time, however. Reason very often makes mistakes at first, but when it is trained it becomes a more valuable and powerful than instinct.
The third monkey, Jacko, tried to eat his egg in much the same way that Bob did; but, not liking the taste, he threw it away.
