### Japan Grabs Korea

Japan is that broke the Korean's 3,000 years of bitter opposition to the free intercourse of foreigners with the subjects of the Hermit Kingdom. Within a month the assassin has twice struck down high Japanese officials. The excuse for seizing the Korean government is ample and to oppose Japan there is none.

### Workmen As Shareholders.

Toronto World.

About a year ago The World noticed the co-partnership scheme established at the instance of Sir Christopher Furness in connection with Irvine's Shipbuilding and Drydock Company, at West Hartlepool, England. By it the employees of the firm were enabled to become shareholders, and 50,000 shares of £1 each were allotted to them, each employee agreeing that a regular deduction of five per cent. be made from his pay until the shares were fully paid up. A communication was recently issued to the employe shareholders by the directors, who state that they consider the results of the working of the company since the adoption of the scheme are very satisfactory from every point of view.

Every steamer built and repaired since the commencement of the co-partnership arrangement had been delivered in accordance with the terms of the contract. This was given as a sample of the evidence as to the success of the scheme and the loyalty of the men. A dividend has been declared on the agreed basis—four per cent. to the employe shareholders and five per cent. to the ordinary shareholders. In addition, a bonus of five per cent. has been given to both classes of shareholders.
