NEARLY LOST HIS LIFE

A TORONTO FIREMAN WAS SUFFOCATED

Fire in Boston Shoe Store on Yonge Street—The Cobalt Ore Cases—Eight Men Committed for Trial.

Toronto, Jan. 6.—Fire caused by escaping gas, broke out in the cellar of the Boston Shoe Store, 106 Yonge street, about two o'clock this morning, and although the material damage resulting was slight, a fireman almost lost his life through suffocation.

Abraham Cochran, fifty-two years old and married, was overpowered and it was some time before he was restored to consciousness. He is now in St. Michael's hospital. The flames were almost entirely confined to the basement so that little damage was done to the stock or fixtures. The building is owned by Lawrence Solman.

The winding up of the Toronto Park company was granted this morning, with E. R. C. Clarkson as liquidator and George Kappelle as referee. The company was organized in 1906 with a capital of \$1,000,000. The company gave its liabilities as \$26,000, but no statement of assets is as yet available.

On charges of illegal trafficking in ore, J. E. Wilkinson, J. Zoyetz, Jacob Cohen, Morris Kowalinsky, Niel Lander, Alexander Littlejohn, George Barber and James Connolly were all committed for trial, this morning, by Magistrate Denison, and all were admitted to bail as before. Demitras Andrews was acquitted. The evidence taken was that of the mine inspector and the detectives who made the arrests.

Death In The Cold.

Madrid, Jan. 7.—Hundreds of persons in Northwestern Spain, made homeless by the recent floods, are dying from exposure to the cold that has gripped the flooded territory. The situation is desperate and all attempts to furnish adequate relief have failed. The cold has driven the mountain wolves to the villages where they have killed stock and, in several instances, children. The harbors are ice bound. Unless the cold spell abates soon an enormous death toll will result.
