AT PRAYER SERVICE

REV. S. SELLERY'S ADDRESS ON THURSDAY NIGHT.

"Jesus Christ and the Nation" Was the Subject He Dealt With—Religion Has to do With a Nation's Making.

The Thursday night meeting, in connection with the special week of prayer, was held in the First Baptist church. The pastor, Rev. D. Laing, presided, and Rev. S. Sellery, was the speaker. His subject was "Jesus Christ and the Nation."

Rev. Mr. Sellery spoke in part: What has Christianity to do with the state, with its well being, its prosperity, its stability, and what has Christianity to do with trade, with commerce, with education, with the strength and influence of a nation. Christianity, you say, has to do with our salvation, with our getting to Heaven, but what has it to do with finances. Where is the balance of trade? Is not that the question? For what interest can the nation borrow? Is not that the test? Why should righteousness stalk a nation. Why should unrighteousness unmake a nation? Why does not atheism or infidelity endow universities, liberate slaves, create noble civilizations? That it does not belong to the eternal fitness of things. "Rome shall perish" sang the poet, but why, and the answer is, because of the blood that she has spilt. The violation of the eternal laws of righteousness is the undermining of national strength. "What makes nations great and keeps them so." The answer is righteousness. "What ruins kingdoms and lays cities flat." The answer is sin, moral corruption. An unrighteous people can transform into a desert a land once flowing with milk and honey. This is what has happened in Palestine under the reign of the Turk. A righteous people can take a comparatively bleak and barren country and make it a glory and power in the world. This is what the Pilgrims and Puritans did in New England. It is no accident of geography that Christian nations rule the world. If a Christian people had occupied China during these long ages that marvelously rich region would long before now have been the focus of the world. The chief element in national prosperity is national character and the chief element in national character is religion.

It is certain that religion cannot change the climate of a country. It cannot make fertile soil out of rocks and boulders. It cannot make lakes and rivers, forests and mines. These things have to do with a nation's prosperity and influence. It follows that all nations cannot be equally prosperous and powerful. What claim is that religion has more to do with a nation's making or unmaking than anything else, than all things else put together. Without true religion a nation cannot become enduringly prosperous. Why do we want Christ and His religion to dominate this world? Why do we want to put an end to all other religions? Because we believe that Christianity will do more for the individual, for the home, for the nation, for the world than any other religion. It will develop the highest type of manhood and the highest type of civilization. What is the highest type of civilization? This appears to be the first principle of the super-

GOES TO SCOTLAND

CONUL HOWARD D. VAN SANT PROMOTED.

Completes his duties here on March 1st—He will be succeeded here by Felix S. S. Johnston, Consul at Bergen, Norway.

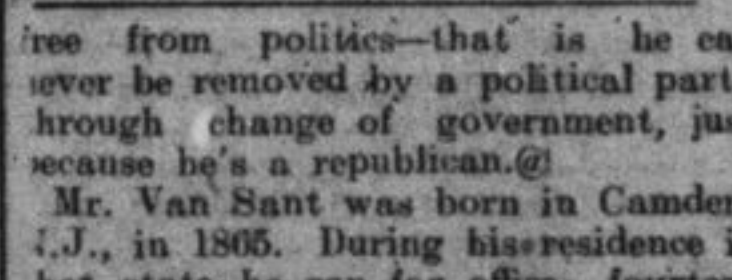
Howard D. Van Sant, United States consul at Kingston, received notification today from Washington of his promotion to the consular post at Dumfries, Scotland, a city of 30,000 inhabitants on the North Sea. He will be succeeded here on March 1st by Felix S. S. Johnston, consul at Bergen, Norway. The transfer is quite a promotion for Mr. Van Sant, who has been in the service only a little over five years, in which time he has received four advancements. He was first appointed as consul at Guelph, Ont. on November 8th, 1905, he was promoted to Kingston. Two years later his salary was raised. Then the grade of the consulate was raised and other consulates in the district abolished. Mr. Van Sant is now in a grade of consularship that is entirely

free from politics—that is he can never be removed by a political party through change of government, just because he is a republican.

Mr. Van Sant was born in Camden, N.J., in 1865. During his residence in that state he ran for office fourteen times, was elected thirteen times, and once the election was a tie. He was mayor of Island Heights, N.J., four terms. He served five years as deputy county clerk in the court house at Tom's River.

The departure of Mr. Van Sant from Kingston will be sincerely regretted by his citizens, for he was a popular consul, and always had a cherry word or his scores of warm friends. He has been a leading member of the Frontenac Club, and the Yacht Club, and took a keen interest in Board of Trade matters. He thus identified himself with Kingston's social, sporting and commercial life. His promotion is well merited for he has been an able representative of the United States government. His handling of the American citizenship question and of smuggling operations recently probably resulted in his selection for the post in Scotland, where he will have a wider field for his abilities. He regrets to leave Kingston, and sever so many friendships. This city will remain dear to him, for it was here his little daughter was born.

His successor, Mr. Johnston, is also an experienced man, and has been pointed out for several years to be appointed home, as he is to be near his home. Mr. Johnston is highly spoken of by Mr. Van Sant as a gentleman of about sixty years of age, and has had twenty-two years of consular service. He was first appointed deputy consul at Kehl, Germany, in 1877, then he was transferred to Freiburg, in 1891. His next post was commercial agent at St. Lawrence, Quebec, in 1899. Then in 1905 he became consul at Puerto Cortes, Honduras, and was transferred to Bergen, Norway, as consul.

The United States consulate in Kingston was established in 1864.

SOME FURTHER CASES

Of Typhoid Fever in Various Parts of City.

There are a number of typhoid fever cases in different parts of the city, and Dr. Williamson, medical health officer, is trying to ascertain the cause. Not two of the houses involved are supplied with milk from the same dairy. So far as can be ascertained the milk supply is free from contamination. The city water has been tested bacteriologically from time to time, and found all right. The health officer intends to test samples of water taken from the vicinity of dead ends of water mains, which he lately advocated connecting so as to have a free circuit. There are only a small number of typical cases as yet, and they're scattered, but if more develop, the health officer will recommend other measures.
